NEW BOARDS

ORGANIZE

Many Changes Made by Local School Directors.

Democrats Take Control of the Borough Board and Elect New Officers--Foster Men Rebuke Treachery.

Freeland school board met Monday evening with Directors Kline, Trevaskis, Everitt, McCole, VanHorn, Timony, Isaac and Krommes present. The following bills were ordered paid: National Publishing Company, books, \$7.40; J. H. Trevaskis, salary as secretary, \$125; postage, etc., \$1.39; C. O. Stroh, Esq., salary as solicitor, \$40; Electric Light Company, \$7; Cox Bros. & Co., coal, \$30.50; Freeland Water Company, \$13.88; Press, paper, 70c; Tribune, paper, \$2; William Solt, labor, etc., \$15.77; W. E. Martin, glass, \$3.55; M. E. Grover, 40c; total, \$227.69.

Treasurer VanHorn reported a balance of \$501.67. Supervising Principal Houck's report for the ninth month and a review of the term was presented. The enrollment for May was 783, an increase of 127 over the same month last year; for the year the enrollment was 1,098, an increase of 96. The report showed the following promotions: C to B Primary, 168; B to A, 113; A to C Intermediate, 105; C to B, 97; B to A, 55, A to B Grammar, 26; B to A, 16; A to High School, 14; First Year High School to Junior Year, 13; Junior to Senior Year, 10; total number of promotions, 617.

The report also showed that the present schools will be unable to accommodate the pupils next term, without allowing for any increase, and that at least two more rooms must be provided for primary department pupils.

The report was accepted and referred to the incoming board. A vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring members, Messrs. Kline, Trevaskis, Brown, Krommes, VanHorn and Everitt, after which the board approved its minutes and adjourned.

The remaining directors, Messrs. McCole, Isaac and Timony, organized temporarily by electing Director Isaac chairman and Director McCole secretary.

The election certificates of the new members were read and accepted and the following took their seats as directors: W. J. Brogan, Daniel S. Buckley, Dominic Kelly, W. D. Kline, Hugh McGeehan, William J. Purcell, D. F. Shelhamer and Thomas A. Slatery.

A permanent organization was effected by electing Mr. Slatery president and Mr. Purcell secretary. Mr. McCole was chosen treasurer and John J. McBrearty, Esq., solicitor. There was no opposition to any of the above.

For janitor the names of Bart McClellan and William Solt were presented.

The salaries of all the officers were placed the same as last year, viz.: Secretary, \$125 per year; treasurer, 2 per cent on all moneys expended; solicitor, \$40 per year; janitor, \$30 per month during the school term. The treasurer's bond was placed at \$20,000.

The first Wednesday evening of each month was selected as the regular meeting night.

The manual governing the schools was re-adopted, after which the board adjourned until this evening.

The retired board consisted of eight Republicans and two Democrats. The present board is composed of eight Democrats and four Republicans.

FOSTER BOARD.

The New Directors Given Two of the Offices by Their Colleagues.

Messrs. McHugh, Keller, Doudt and Argust were present at the meeting of the Foster school board Monday evening. In the absence of President Lesser, Mr. McHugh presided. A vote of thanks was tendered Messrs. Lesser and Argust, the retiring directors. The board then adjourned sine die.

A temporary organization was effected by the election of Director Doudt as chairman and Director McHugh secretary. The certificates of Neil P. Johnson and John O'Neil were received and the members seated.

The following officers were unanimously chosen: President, Neil P. Johnson; secretary, Frank McHugh; treasurer, John O'Neil. President Johnson made a neat speech and asked the aid and co-operation of his colleagues in keeping the standard of the schools and pupils at the present high mark and by economy and business methods transact the duties entrusted to them:

The first Saturday of each month was fixed as the regular meeting. The bond of Treasurer O'Neil was fixed at \$30,000. The board will meet June 15.

COUNCIL MEETING.

Monthly Session of the Borough Legislators Held Monday Evening.

The June meeting of the borough council was held Monday evening, with all members present except Messrs. P. G. Gallagher and Schnee. A request for an increase of 25 cents per day was received from the employees of the street department. Street Commissioner Shovlin was fined one day's pay for neglecting his work.

A petition for an arc light at Birkbeck and Walnut streets was read and referred to the light committee.

The following nominations were announced by President Moerschbacher and approved by council as members of the Board of Health: Dr. Portser, one year; John B. Hanlon, two years; John E. McHugh, three years; Jacob Ssonowski, four years; Charles Dusheck, five years.

The solicitor was instructed to have the bonds of the ex-treasurers released. The tax levy for the year was fixed as follows: Light and water, 8 mills; borough purposes, 5 mills; sinking fund, 5 mills.

The finance committee was instructed to take action to compel the auditor appointed by court in the matter of the South Heberton annexation to file his report.
