

Quit Work Today.

Trouble is Caused by the Firm Refusing to Allow Extra Compensation to Men in Wet Breasts.

Men in Wet Breasts. The employes of the Hazle Brook colliery of J. S. Wentz & Co. quit work this morning and all opera-tions at that place are at a standstill. The cause of the trouble, as near as can be learned from the men, is the action of the bosses in compelling men to work in breasts where the downpour of water is such that the workers cannot stand it for any length of time without risking their health. It is also claimed that the bosses use this method to get square with men who are personally obnoxious to the management.

The men have tried in every honor-able way to settle the difficulty and procure extra compensation for the hardships endured in those breasts, but the company refused and turned a deaf ear to their appeals.
