While engaged at this work they heard a trip of cars coming, and, not having sufficient space to stand at the side while the cars were passing, both scrambled under the platform at the mouth of their breast, thinking that there they had found a place where

they would be secure from danger of every kind. The trip passed, but before the miners had time to emerge from their hiding hole a large mass of coal fell from the roof above the platform. The latter structure immediately gave way and both men were caught beneath the tim-bers and the coal, causing instant death. The driver, returning along the gang-way a few minutes later, saw the effects of the disaster and summoned help. The bodies of the men were quickly un-

overed and removed to their homes in swamptown, Jeddo. Mike Raymuck was aged 55 years and survived by his wife and four children. Peter Chepa was aged 36 years and is

urvived by his wife and three children. The funerals will take place at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Raymuck was a member of St. Peter
