TO HOLD A CONVENTION

General Meeting of Miners Has Been Called.

Representatives of the Three Districts Summoned to Gather at Hazleton on August 27.

After a three days' meeting, held at Hazleton, which ended on Saturday afternoon, the executive boards of Districts 1, 7 and 9, of the United Mine Workers of America, adjourned without coming to any decisive understanding on the matters which made their meeting necessary.

In fact, the matters discussed at the meeting of the executive boards' members were deemed so important that a general convention was considered necessary, before final action should be taken.

The call for this convention has been issued. It will be held on August 27, at Hazleton, providing that city can demonstrate its ability to provide for and accommodate the number of delegates who will attend.

Representatives from every local union of the United Mine Workers in the anthracite region will be present. It is expected that no less than 1,000 men will attend the convention.

The members of the executive boards have not made public the causes or the questions which make the convention necessary, but it is understood that the recent card day troubles and the ill-feeling engendered by the recent strike of the firemen are among the number.

The miners desire the public to understand that the convention is not called for the purpose of declaring a strike, or considering such action. The organization is especially desirous of avoiding making any move at this time which would result in a suspension of work, and no trouble on that score need be feared, unless those corporations which are ruled by men whose prejudice against labor unions is so bitter that they will insist on continuing their discriminating and aggravating methods. Smith Rebuked by Kudlick.

Alex. Allen, Sr., of Drifton, was before Squire Shovlin on Saturday to answer a charge of assault and battery, preferred by Bernard McLaughlin, Jr., of town. The prosecutor claimed that while on his way home from Jeddo he met Allen in Drifton and was struck by him without provocation. The defendant claimed the blow was an accidental one, given while getting out of the way of the wheel ridden by McLaughlin. Neither side had any witnesses and the justice discharged the case.

An amusing incident occurred during Constable Welsh's visit to Drifton to arrest Mr. Allen. While on his way to Freeland with the prisoner they passed the main office of Cox & Co. Mr. Allen asked and received permission from the constable to notify Superintendent Smith of his arrest. When the pompous official heard of the affair he gave one of his bi-weekly exhibitions of ignorance.

He demanded that he be shown the warrant, claimed that the document was not legally served on Mr. Allen and insisted that he be told before whom the hearing would take place. Failing to bulldoze the constable, he contended that the prisoner could not be taken to Freeland until he had his dinner.

Just as he was about reaching the limit of his interference with the law, Superintendent Kudlick arrived on the scene and promptly rebuked Smith for his foolishness, after which the officer and Mr. Allen proceeded on their way to Squire Shovlin's office.

A Deserved Promotion.

P. H. Murphy, district superintendent of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, who has been located in town for some years past, was agreeably surprised last week to receive notice from the company that his work in this district has been appreciated and has earned for him a promotion. He has been appointed superintendent of the district of which Uniontown, Fayette county, is the headquarters, and will assume the duties of his new position as soon as the business here can be arranged for his successor.

Large Parade Assured.

The responses to the invitations sent out by the Central Labor Union of Freeland and vicinity to the labor organizations of the Lehigh region, to participate in the parade here on Labor Day, are very encouraging. A sufficient number of Mine Workers' locals have already responded favorably to assure the success of the demonstration, and if the same proportion of acceptances is continued the town will be taxed to accommodate the organized workmen who will be here on September 2.

Derailed by a Cow.

A Jersey Central passenger train, while on its way to Sandy Run on Saturday, struck a cow east of Pond Creek. The accident derailed the coach, which toppled over. The engine was also damaged. There were no passengers on the train at the time. The train hands, however, were severely shaken up, but all escaped serious injury except one, Mr. Conroy, whose arm was broken. That the accident did not cause the death of all on the train is regarded as miraculous.

Cave-in at Sandy Run.

At Sandy Run on Saturday morning a cave-in occurred which took down part of the loche track and a section of a Jersey Central siding. The consequent inability to reach the breaker with railroad cars, owing to the cave-in, caused the colliery to suspend operations. The work of filling the hole is being pushed forward and the breaker will likely resume tomorrow.
