FISH WITH WINGS AND BEAK

A Cyrano de Bergerac In the Ocean Has Been Discovered. Flying fish, called by naturalists "exocotus," are a common sight to all "exocœtus," are a common sight to all voyagers in tropical and subtropleat seas. Their usual length is from 10 to 12 Inches, though one 18 Inches long has recently been described. They are enabled to execute flying leaps by means of the great development of their forward or pectoral fins. During flight the fins are kept quietly distended, without any motion. Their flight is rapid, greatly exceeding that of a ship going ten miles an hour, but gradually decreasing in velocity and rarely extending beyond a distance of 500 feet.

Another curious fish is the halfbeak, which has an extraordinarily long protuberance from the end of the lower jaw. They usually attain a length of about a foot. Of course they have not the power of flight as the flying fishes have. Yet naturalists considered them closely related to the flying fish. The relationship has been fully confirmed by a unique specimen discovered in the ichthyloigical collection of the Academy of Natural Sciences and named "Hemiexocotus candimaculatus," or "the half flying fish with a spotted tail."

This curious creature, although only a little over an inch in length, is certainly one of the most interesting discoveries recently made in leithtyology. It has a tail and large forward fins exactly like the flying fish, but its head is wholly different, for the lower jaw is extended into a curious beakilke structure, the mouth being at its base. In this respect it exactly resembles the halfbeak.

Hemiexocostus is therefore an intermediate form connecting two important groups of fishes, and his advent upon the leithtyological horizon will no doubt be halled with much interest, as it is just such forms as these that are needed in zoological science to bridge over gaps in the genealogical history of many animate creatures. The specimen in question was obtained from the western coast of Mexico, in the guif of California.—Philadelphia Record.

White Lead a Deadly Poison.

A vigorous campaign is being carried on in France against the use of blanc de cernse (carbonate of lead) in painting. This is in accordance with a resolution passed by the superior council of hygiene of France, which ranked white lead among the deadly poisons. It is well known that this pigment is the common cause of the lead poisoning so widespread among painters.

The director of posts and telegraphs has forbidden its use in all the offices under his control, and in addition the painters of Grenoble have gone on strike to demand that all employers should use zine white instead of lead white. Zinc white is far less poisonous, but more expensive, as owing to its want of "body" more coats have to be laid on.

I suppose there are in the city of New Orleans 100,000 watches and clocks to be wound up every day, so that nearly a month is spent in the city every day in winding watches and clocks.
