BIG CAVE-IN THIS MORNING

Lehigh Valley Tracks Go
Down at Highland.

All Railroad Communication
Suspended Between Free-
land and Wilkesbarre.
Large Area Affected.

At an early hour this morning a large cave-in occurred in No. 1 colliery, Highland, and the consequent disturbing of the surface caused suspension of traffic on the Lehigh Valley Railroad between Freeland and Wilkesbarre. No trains were run today over the affected part of the road until 11.51 a. m., when the north-bound passenger train passed safely over the cave-in.

The workings of No. 1 Highland colliery undermine the railroad tracks for a considerable distance between Freeland and Highland. At the point where the cave-in occurred this morning, near the stripping at the intersection of the Highland and Sandy Run turnpikes, the danger has been known to exist for some time and a watchman has been stationed at the spot.

The cave-in covers an area of several acres. The ground under the railroad tracks settled about five feet, and at some points the rails were somewhat twisted by the drop.

Early this morning the railroad company set a large force of men at work repairing the breaks and raising the tracks, and at 11.45 o'clock the damage done had been overcome sufficiently to permit the train due at 11.51 to pass safely over the ground.

The northbound train leaving here at 7.34 a. m. was taken off at Freeland, and the one due here from the upper end at 9.30 o'clock was run from White Haven via Penn Haven.

The cave-in occurred at an hour when the road is not being used, otherwise a serious accident might have happened.

Will Not Change Name.

Over four hours were taken up at yesterday's session of the Irish Catholic Benevolent Union convention, at Plymouth, in a debate as to the changing of the word Irish to international. It was a fight between the delegates representing different sections of the United States. The New England representatives were heartily in favor of this substitution of names, while the Philadelphia delegation were about evenly divided on the matter. The motion to substitute was defeated.

The time for holding the convention was changed from annual to biennial. The secretary's salary was reduced from \$500 to \$400 and the per capita tax, regardless of sex, was fixed at 10 cents.

The Anthracite Market.

Saward's Coal Trade Journal for this week has the following:

"With the first of next month the last of the 10 cent monthly advances in the price of hard coal, as per the plan laid down in March last, will have taken place. This will bring the prices up to the rate prevailing in the spring of the year, and the arrangement has proven a good one to the trade in its entirety. It is one of those old-fashioned ideas which is well worthy of revival.

"It is the sheerest rubbish to talk of 'merciless coal barons' in connection with the arrangement which has prevailed, and only those of little knowledge or of limited experience in the trade will do so, and give the press the very erroneous ideas of this industry, which we find only too frequently.

Old Residents Ailing.

Mr. and Mrs. William Carter, of Walnut street, are both ailing. The former has been a resident of this vicinity for over forty years, and worked in the mines at Pinkash, Jeddo, when that colliery was first opened. Mr. Carter is able to move about, suffering no pain, but is troubled with a stiffness of his limbs.

Mrs. Carter has lost the sight of one eye from a cataract and is gradually losing the sight of the other. She is, however, able to sit up and converse with her friends and relatives, and is well booked in local history, having come to this vicinity when a young woman.

School-Going Children.

The assessors of the county have completed their returns of the school children in each of the several districts. All children between the ages of 6 and 21 years have been counted. The county has a total school-going population of over 74,000.

Wilkesbarre leads with 13,530. Hazle township comes next with 4,302, followed by Hazleton with 4,034.

Freeland has 909 male and 924 female school-going children, a total of 1,833; Foster has 2,154, Jeddo 125, Butler 569, West Hazleton 847 and White Haven 450.

Will Return to Hungary.

Joseph Zwolenski has disposed of his saloon business at the northwest corner of Centre and Luzerne streets, and with his family will leave in a few weeks for his native country, Hungary. Since entering business Mr. Zwolenski has been very successful, and with the money he has saved he will spend the balance of his life in comfort in the land of his birth.

"Joe" has always been considered a good citizen and the news of his intended departure is regretted by his many friends.

Smith Again Heard From.

A new order issued by Superintendent Smith, of Coxe Bros. & Co., notifies the miners employed by that company that all cars must be heavily topped when they reach the breakers. As cars topped at the breakers will lose a considerable part of their load while being carried along the gangways and up the slopes, the miners are in a quandary as to how they can keep the topping on.

ROUND THE REGION.

Constable Griffith, of Lansford, came to Mauch Chunk yesterday with a warrant for the arrest of Sheriff Gombert. He took that officer into custody on oath of James W. Maloy, publisher of the Lansford Record, charging him with making a contract or agreement for his election November 6, 1900. Sheriff Gombert waived a hearing before Justice Boyle, and gave bail in \$300 for appearance at the next term of court. It is not known what the specific charges are.

The refusal of Ida May Barber, of Avondale, to accept the attentions of John Boyle, a young miner, has led him to very desperate acts. Constables are now searching for him on the charge of tearing Miss Barber's wardrobe into shreds, he having entered her home and destroyed all her gowns. Tillman Newhart, a rival of Boyle for Miss Barber's favor, recently committed suicide on being jilted by Miss Barber.

An attempt to start the Sterling silk mills, at Pittston, after a nine months' tie-up, ended in a fight. Ten non-union workers reported at the mills yesterday morning and worked under protection during the day. Shortly before dark they emerged. There was a howl from the strikers. Then stones began to fly, and the non-union girls ran down the hills as fast as they could to escape. Many were hit by the flying missiles.

In a quarrel over division of a legacy, inherited recently by the children of Anthony Brady, of Duryea, Walter Burke, a brother-in-law, tried to kill Brady by shooting him with a revolver. In a live bird shooting tournament at Dallas the Luzerne county championship was wrested from E. S. Eley, a long time holder, by M. Coolbaugh. The shoot was at ten birds, twenty-one yards rise, eighty yards boundary, with one barrel gun privilege. Coolbaugh killed nine birds.

There is probability that the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company will operate its collieries full time in September and until cold weather sets in. It will be the policy of the company to ship as much coal to the market as possible during that time.
