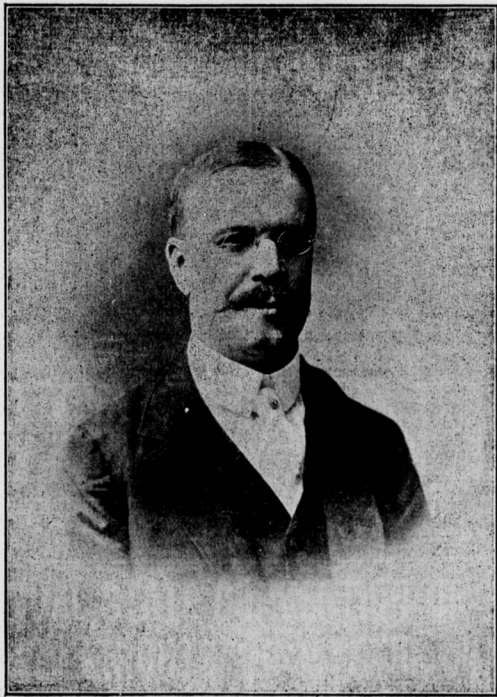

PEOPLE'S ALLIANCE.

General Convention of the Organization Was Held Yesterday.

The People's Alliance, in convention at Hazleton yesterday, adopted the report of the conference committee which was appointed to devise a method to bring about a settlement of the coal strike and adopt plans to prevent a repetition of such industrial conflicts.

The executive committee consisted of one representative from each local branch. J. J. McMenamin served on the committee for Freeland. This committee, among other things, advised that the governor be asked to call a special session of the state legislature to enact legislation recommended by the convention; that present legislation be revised so that the state may have more power over foreign corporations doing business within its borders; that a law be passed making it illegal for an person under 21 years of age to be employed more than eight hours a day; the enforcement of Sections 16 and 17 of Article 10 of the state constitution, which provide for the revocation of the charters of corporations which abuse the privileges granted therein.

The conference committee will call upon Governor Stone and request that he call a special session of the legislature as soon as possible. There were present seventy-five delegates from alliances in twenty-one towns in the coal regions. Organization was effected by the election of the following officers:

President, D. J. McCarthy, Hazleton; vice presidents, John H. Bernard, McAdoo; Hugh Malloy, Freeland; J. W. Gerhart, Ashland; M. C. Watson, Shenandoah, and T. F. Hart, Wilkesbarre; secretaries, E. J. McGinnis, Girardville, and C. F. Straughn, Shenandoah; treasurer, John Smith, Mahanoy City.

Senator Quay and Senator Platt held a long conference in New York city last night. It was said that they decided to have the Pennsylvania legislature convene in extra session and begin war on the coal operators with a view to ending the strike. Both senators fear the strike will hurt their party in the coming campaign.

School Board Meeting.

Directors Brogan, Buckley, Fetterman, Isaac, Kline, McGeehan, Shelhamer and Timony were present at the September meeting of the borough school board, which was held last evening. Mr. Brogan was chosen chairman. Interest amounting to \$75 on a \$1,500 mortgage held by Gabriel Miller on South Washington street property was ordered paid, and the \$3,000 insurance on Eckley B. Cox building was ordered renewed.

A discussion on repairs to the heating furnace in Daniel Cox building resulted in the board viewing the apparatus as a committee of the whole and recommending to the building committee that galvanized-iron stacks be placed from the furnace to the chimney.

The building committee was empowered to sell all scrap-iron, broken castings, etc., in the several buildings. The solicitor was ordered to release the bonds of ex-Treasurers Everitt and McCole.

Treasurer Timony reported a balance on August 31 of \$2,258.23. The secretary was authorized to procure such coal as may be required by the schools before the October meeting of the board.

The following bills were ordered paid: Press, publishing statement, \$8.15; Electric Light Company, 89c; R. J. O'Donnell, Esq., recorder's fee filing bond, \$1.50; Bernard Boyle, hauling ashes, \$3; cleaning schools, Mrs. Mary McGeehan, \$20; Mrs. Matthew Murphy, \$14; Mrs. James Wilson, \$6; Mrs. Martin Jacobs, \$6; Mrs. James O'Donnell, \$3; Miss Bridget McLaughlin, \$6; Mrs. Denis Brislin, \$6; total, \$74.54.

Prohibition Addresses.

Rev. Dr. Swallow, of Harrisburg, Prohibition candidate for governor, and E. D. Nichols, of Wilkesbarre, spoke to an audience of 300 people at the Public park yesterday afternoon. Both gentlemen delivered good addresses and their remarks were favorably commented upon. They are making a strong effort this year to poll a large vote for the state ticket of the Prohibition party.

Twenty-six strikers were convicted in Schuylkill court yesterday of rioting and were sentenced to pay the costs and give bail for their good behavior. All were taken to jail. The county commissioners will release them from the payment of the costs tomorrow and they will be allowed to go free.

Hazleton club was invited to play a game here next week, during the K. of M. C. convention, but the manager positively refuses to risk the reputation of his team by playing away from the protection of the "hoodlums" who congregate at Hazle park.
