It is unfortunately a fact that little children are employed in some of the southern cotton mills who ought to be at school and who are be-ing deprived of their childhood. But in a recent number of McClure's Maga-sine Mr. Francis H. Nichols directs at-tention to child labor in a northern state, compared with whom those of the south enjoy a life of ense and pleasure. These unhappy little toilers are in the anthracite region of Penn-sylvania and number nearly 30,000, of whom 24,000 are boys who work for the mining companies and the other girls who work in tettle mills estab-lished in the mining region is becom-ing more and more densely ignorant, bitterly hating their employers, but knowing nothing beyond coal mining and for this reason absolutely at the mercy of pitiless corporationa.—Balti-more Sun.
