

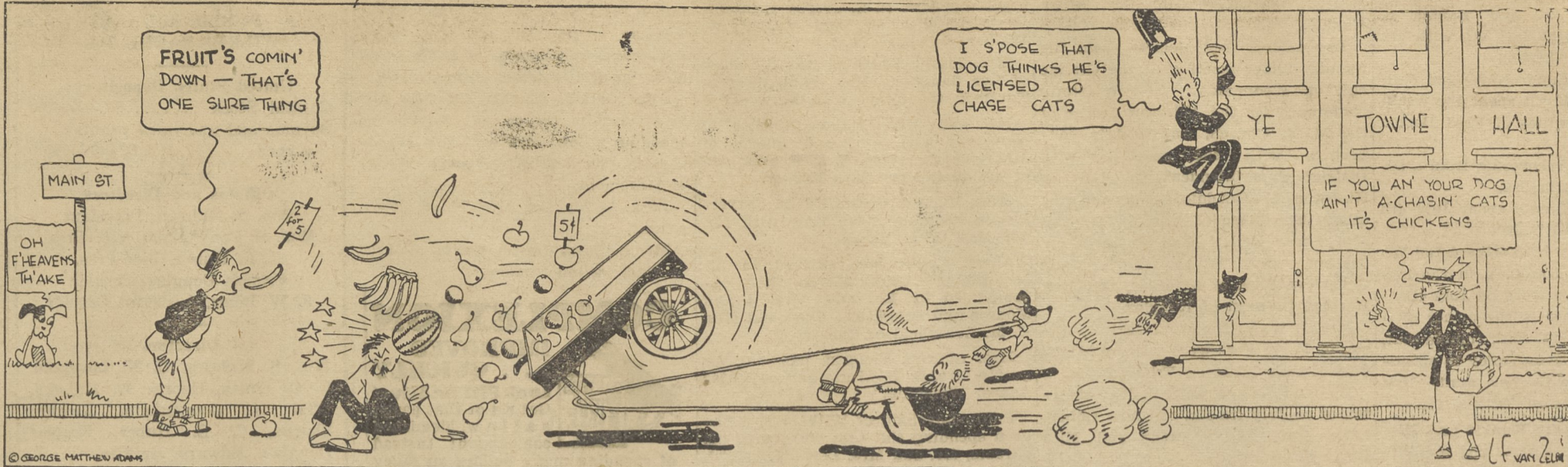

Miss Mary Kuchta spent the weekend at her home here in Alderson. Miss Kuchta is attending summer school at Bloomsburg State Teachers' College.

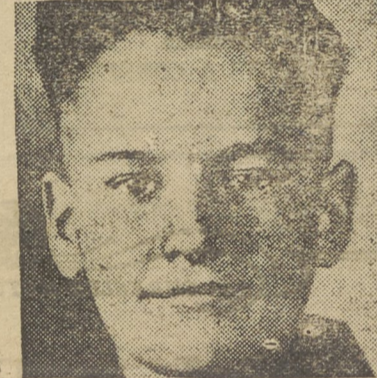

Richard Prynne, who has been suffering with a broken jaw, is improving.

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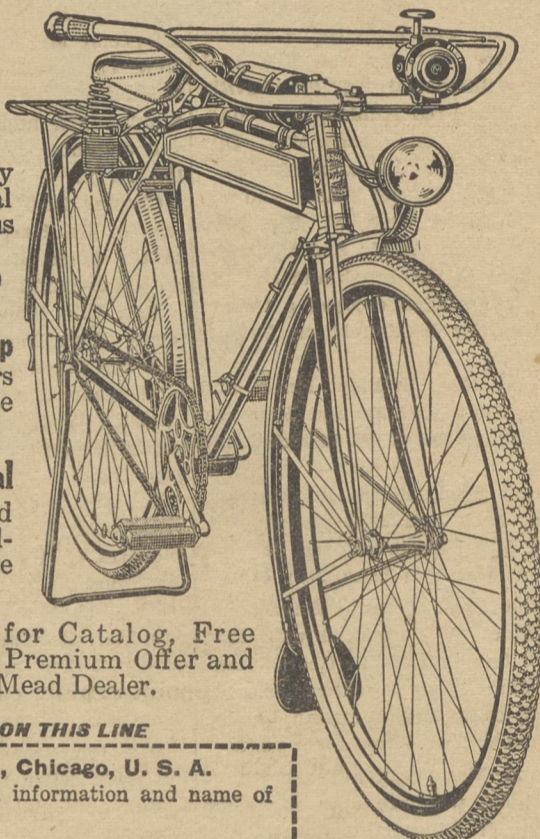
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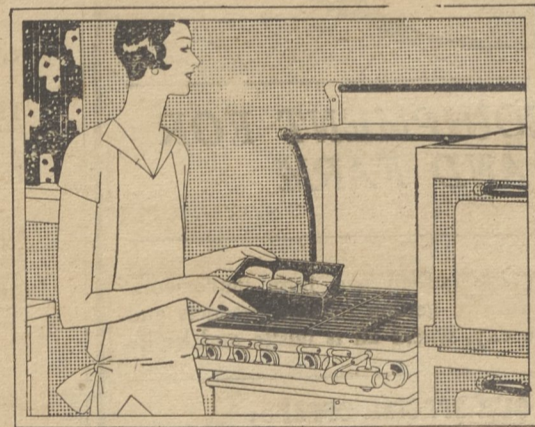
