

JOSEPH R. GRUNDY SAYS PENNA. OVERSHADOWS 25 OTHER STATES IN MANUFACTURE AND INDUSTRY

Table Shows 22 in Their Total Income Contributions Nearly \$5,000,000 Less Than Keystone State Alone. Some Agricultural Statistics.

Washington.—In his statement submitted to the Senate Lobby Investigating Committee, Joseph R. Grundy incorporated tables which revealed Pennsylvania, not only as a manufacturing State but likewise as one of the leaders in agriculture. It

also is shown in one of the tables that the value of Pennsylvania's manufactured products is approximately equal to that of 25 other States combined.

In another table is shown the number of wage earners and the wages

paid in Connecticut, Illinois, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania as compared to Arizona, Arkansas, South Dakota, Idaho, Mississippi, Montana and Wisconsin.

As shown in the following table, the value of Pennsylvania's manufactured products is approximately equal to that of 25 other States combined:
