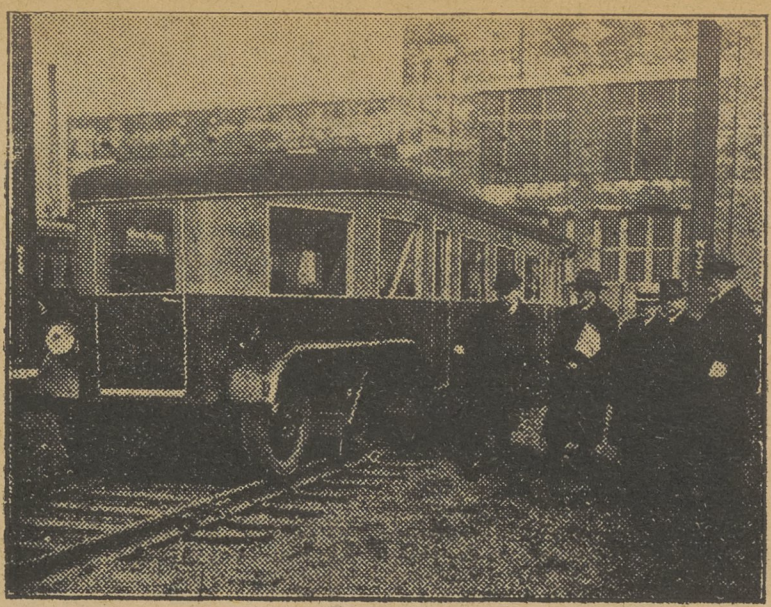


Dallas News Items

Shavertown Residents File Petition Asking Court To Form A New Borough

Petition Comes As Result of Bitter Feelings Over School Affairs In Kingston Township

Residents of Kingston township living in Shavertown have filed a petition with Luzerne county court for the formation of a borough to be known as Shavertown borough. Petitions were filed this week by Atty. D. O. Coughlin, solicitor for the petitioners. Notice was served upon other residents of Kingston township, through advertising notices in Wilkes-Barre papers, that a majority of the freeholders living in the village of Shavertown have signed the petition. The desire on the part of Shavertown residents to have a borough, is an outgrowth of the recent contention over school matters in Kingston township.

Residents of the Shavertown section were incensed because a representative from their community was not elected to the school board at the general election and also because an injunction was served restraining the school board from purchasing the Shaver plot in Shavertown for the erection of a new high school building. Community meetings have been held, feelings have been tense and friendships broken. Petitions have been circulated throughout Shavertown and now comes the showdown, will Luzerne county court grant Shavertown the right to be a borough?

The following is a copy of the petition as filed with Luzerne county court this week:

LEGAL NOTICE TO THE INHABITANTS OF KINGSTON TOWNSHIP...

Notice is hereby given that a majority of the freeholders residing within the limits of the town or village of Shavertown in the township of Kingston, have presented their petition for incorporation of said town or village into a Borough to the Court of Quarter Sessions of said Luzerne County and have filed the same with the Clerk of said Court, the name, style and title of said Borough to be "The Borough of Shavertown," and a particular description of the boundaries thereof is as follows:

BEGINNING at the most Westerly corner of Kingston Township, also a corner of Jackson Township and in line of Dallas Township; thence in a Northeasterly direction along the line of Dallas Township, about three and one-half (3½) miles to a corner of the North East election district; thence Southeasterly along line of said North East election district about Two (2) miles to a corner of the Southwest election district; thence in a Southwesterly direction and at right angles to last mentioned line, along said Southwest election district, and passing to the South of Mt. Greenwood, three and one-third (3 1-3) miles to corner on line of Jackson Township; thence in a Northwesterly direction and about at right angles to last mentioned line about one (1) mile to the place of beginning.
