#### To Ask P. S. C. For Action On Water Problem

Taxpayers' Association Will Carry Campaign To Harrisburg

Formal complaints against the quantity and quality of water supplied homes in Dallas will be presented to Public Service Commission at Harrisburg within the next few weeks by Dallas Borough Taxpayers' Association, it was announced this week.

A resolution authorizing the petition to the Commission was adopted at a meeting of the association in the borough high school auditorium on Monday night. A similar resolution was adopted asking for action by Dallas Borough Council.

Attorney Bert Lewis of Dallas has been appointed to prepare the petition. A committee, headed by Vincent A. Shindel, will carry out the plans to lodge the formal complaint.

Attorney Lewis conferred this week with a member of the Public Service Commission with reference to the manner in which the complaint must be made and has already made request for the forms to be followed in preparing the petition.

The communication to the Commission will be prepared according to standard forms and will request a hearing and investigation, it is ex-pected. Members of the group are confident their move will bring quick and definite results.

The petition will embody crificisms of an alleged insufficient and impure

In 1931 the average cost pupil for current expenses was \$86.8 for all classes of school district, and in 1932 it was \$85.73. The Pennsylvania average cost usually is from one to five dollars a year less than the average for the United States.
