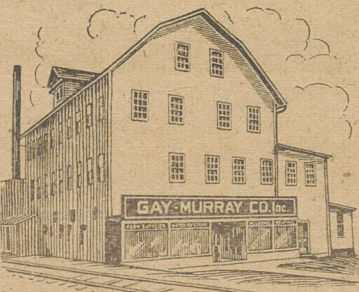

who proclaim that inevitably the pre-depression trend will be resumed, and those who, on the other hand, say that the time of the quantitative expansion of man's control over nature is now rapidly coming to a close.

The Farmer Produces More Engineering and science, combined with the division of labor, have made it possible for an hour of man-labor on the farm to produce several times as much as it did a hundred years ago. In company with the rest of you I have from time to time marveled over the tremendous contribution of the reaper, the binder, the combine, the truck, the tractor, and the gang-plow, but inasmuch as we have now come to days of real soul-searching about all the things which we have hitherto called Progress, I think it is high time for all of us to analyze these various labor-saving devices a little more critically. Do they really save as much as appears on first glance.
