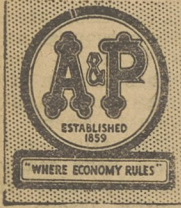

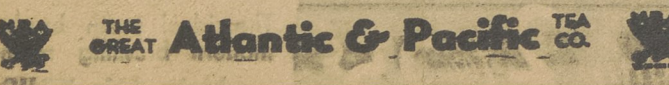

**Crops Among Best**  
(Continued from Page 1)

some sections that it will be necessary to cut many fields with mowers; larger acreage than usual probably will be cut for hay, recent rains promoted growth of late plantings.

Other grains: July 1 condition of barley, rye and spring wheat lowest on record for that date; Winter, barley harvested in southern section and quite a few crops already threshed.

Potatoes—In northwestern counties early plantings suffered greatly from drought, prospects promising in southeastern Pennsylvania.

Tobacco—Warm weather and ample rainfall enabled crop to get off to good start in filler district where transplanting was earlier than usual.

Hay—Hay harvest in years in all sections, except southeastern where crop was so large much was left standing on fields, recent rains very helpful to second crops of clover and alfalfa.

Fruits—Although apple crop promises to be small, fruit is unusually large for this season of year and very clean; peach crop promises to be shortest in years; pears generally clean and of good size, but blight reported bad in southeastern counties; cherry crop somewhat larger than anticipated earlier in season; grapes doing fairly well.

If crop shortages in other parts of Pennsylvania bring price rises, (index of prices paid farmers has already gained one point) Luzerne County farmers, with adequate and good crops, will benefit financially this Fall.

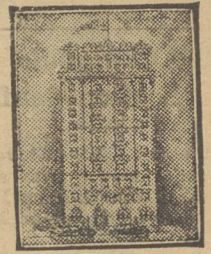

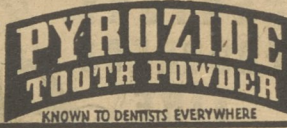
