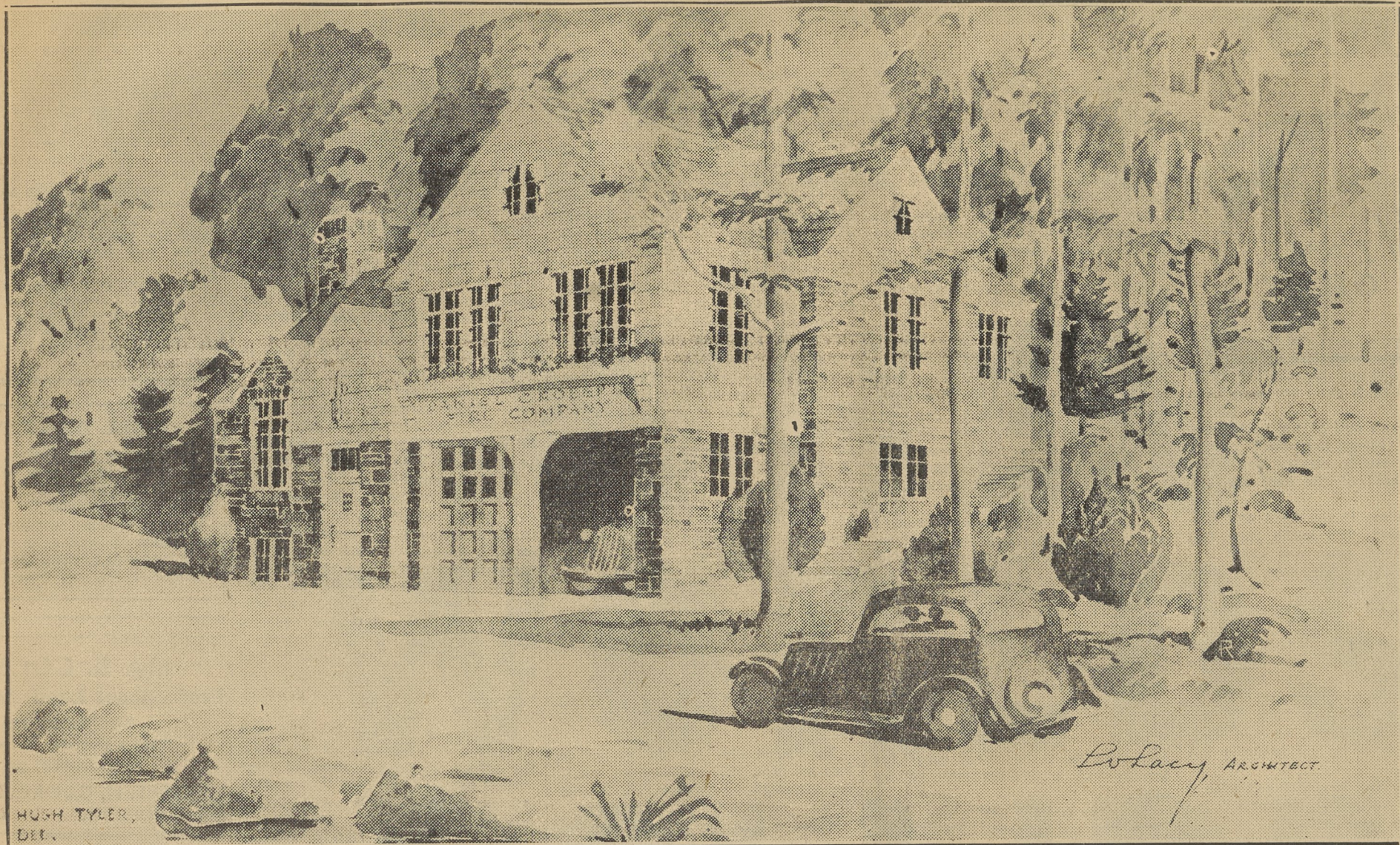


NEW HOME OF DANIEL C. ROBERTS FIRE COMPANY UNDER CONSTRUCTION AT HARVEY'S LAKE

The door at the left leads to a vestibule and to the apartment for the chief of

police on the second floor, the basement, and to the handsome recreation room which is in the left wing.
