



V—Fagoting


for the next stitch across the open-



1. Fagoting Stitch. Make slanting stitches from side to side, passing the needle under the preceding stitch, as shown. Space the stitches about a quarter of an inch apart.



2. Bar Fagoting. Make stitch across opening; then twist needle under and over and under this stitch, as shown. Draw needle through, and then make a quarter inch long stitch parallel to the edge, bringing the needle out ready



Bias Trim Basted to Paper Ready for Fagoting Yoke Design. Cut out neckline of garment to depth de-sired for yoke, and bind edge with hand felled binding of Bias Trim. Cut plain pattern of yoke, mark de sign on it and baste to top of gar-ment, as shown. Baste Bias Trim over design marked on yoke pattern; then fagot, as illustrated. When fagoting is finished remove
