

Program Recalls Prominent Names

Gives Workers On Carverton Circuit Of Church In 1904

An old program for the Carverton Circuit of the Methodist Episcopal Church, added to The Post's collection of local historic papers this week, recalls many names of men and women who were active in church affairs in those days.

C. E. Sweet was pastor of the circuit in 1904, when the program was printed, and his message, dated May 1, apparently came shortly after he had been returned to the local charge by the conference.
