Science Wonders To Be Explained

Associate Of Edison Speaks Tuesday At Borough High School

An associate of Edison and Steinmetz, Harry C. White, known as "the man who has made millions think," will speak in Dallas Borough High School auditorium on Tuesday night at 8:40.

Mr. White will use paraphernalia valued at many thousands of dollars, a complete traveling research library. One of the most interesting of his demonstrations is that with the electric eye. Transmitting a beam of light, it turns on fans, makes bells ring and lights a light at his command.

Mr. White will also show his audience black rays, a phenomenon which permits the human eye to see what it has looked at but never seen. While the room is dark, rays unseen play about, rays that cannot be seen under ordinary light. His
