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Coyotes Not Rare In Pennsylvania

Wyoming County Pack Gets Attention From State Commission

The lonely yapping of coyotes breaks the silence of Wyoming County mountains these winter nights.

A pack of fourteen was seen in that region recently by an army of 100 hunters organized for a war of extermination after a reddish, forty-six pound pack leader was shot and three specimens were trapped.

While local hunters have been puzzled by the appearance of the "varmints", the State Publicity Commission throws light on the supposed mystery by disclosing that coyotes are no rarity in Pennsylvania.

Coyotes have been seen and killed in Bradford, Cambria, Clinton, Fayette, Lackawanna, McKean, Tioga and Westmoreland counties in recent years.

Some of these specimens can be traced directly to the escape of caged animals from private zoos, but others may have wandered into Pennsylvania from Ohio or Indiana where they are occasionally found, or come across the Lake Erie ice from Canada during severe winters.

Probably, like their cousins the wolves, they were once native to Pennsylvania, but were driven away for a time by advancing civilization. Wolves have been seen in Pennsylvania as late as the winter of 1933, but the last pack left in 1882.

One dusky evening of that winter, Robert McCormick, stagedriver on the Bellefonte-Lewistown pike, saw the last wolf-pack in Pennsylvania slinking across the road and heading north toward Canada in flight from the forest-thinning lumbermen. A captive wolf-pack is kept today near Kane, Pa.
