

TURF SPECIALIST GIVES METHODS FOR MAINTAINING AN IDEAL LAWN

Lists Seed Most Suitable For Luzerne County Conditions

VALUABLE POINTERS

Fred V. Grau, turf extension specialist of Pennsylvania State College, speaking before Wyoming Valley Garden Club, gave some excellent pointers to the members present on how to make and maintain a good lawn.

Mr. Grau stated that lime in the form of ground limestone should be applied only once every four to five years at the rate of fifty to sixty pounds to each 1,000 square feet.

Lawns should be fed yearly, with a complete fertilizer, using either a 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 fertilizer mixture. The best time to feed lawn is late August or the first week in September at the rate of 25 pound of the above mixture per 1,000 square feet. When fall feeding has been omitted he suggests an early spring application of a mixture containing fifteen pound of 4-12-4 and fifteen pound of cottonseed meal per 1,000 square feet. The cottonseed meal will prevent burning and also some slow organic nitrogen.

Many of the wood problems and summer burning can be prevented, stated Mr. Grau, by setting the cutter blade on the mower, so that it will clip at 1 1/2 inches instead of 3/4 to 1 inch. The cutter blade can be raised by simply lowering the roller on the mower. High clipping assists in the control of crab grass and many lawn weeds, and helps to produce a dense deep turf that will withstand drought and wear. Only in exceptional cases should clippings be removed, such as extreme heavy clippings or where the regular period of mowing has been missed.

The most ideal lawn for Luzerne County conditions is composed chiefly of Kentucky Blue Grass, Chewings Fescue and Perennial Rye Grass.

Where thin spots occur in the lawn a good seed mixture should be added, the ideal method of adding lawn seed in the spring is to mix two pounds of grass seed with a wheel barrow full of good screened soil.

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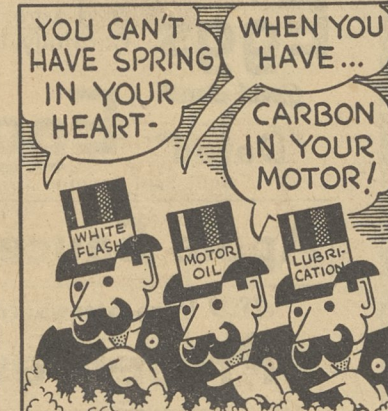
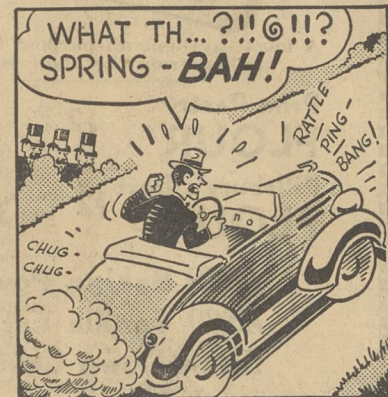
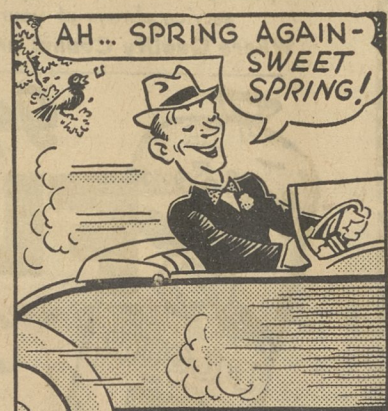
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
