KINGSTON TOWNSHIP VOTERS GIVE JAMES 22 TO 1 LEAD OVER PINCHOT

Defeated Ex-Governor Gets Only 46 of 1,058 Votes Here

321 DEMOCRATS VOTE

Kingston Township Republicans listened carefully to Judge Arthur H. James' plea for a landslide and then rolled up a plurality of 966 for him in Tuesday's election.

James received 22 votes in Kingston Township for every one vote Gifford Pinchot, his opponent for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, received. It was one of the finest tributes given anywhere in the State to the Plymouth jurist.

Although voters here gave strong support to Samuel Lewis, candidate for lieutenant-governor and staunch James supporter, they also turned in a majority for Senator James J. Davis, candidate for re-election, and whose name had been associated with that of Pinchot.

Willard G. Shortz led the race for Representative in the township, with Donald Wilkinson running second and Charles Hoyt of Jackson Township a close third.

About 325 Democrats voted in Kingston Township. Thomas Kennedy led for Governor, S. Davis Wilson for U. S. Senator, Dr. Leo C. Mundy for lieutenant-governor and Harold Flannery for Congress. Attorney Edgar Lare showed his heels to Frederick Pritchard in the battle for the Representative nomination.

The heaviest vote was cast in the Trucksville district, where 523 Republicans and 146 Democrats voted.

Queen's Identity Is A Deep Secret

Pupils Await Crowning Of Regent At Field Day Today

Kingston Township High School's Queen of the May, whose identity is known only to the inner circle which supervised the counting of student ballots, will be presented this morning at 11 at a coronation which will be the most colorful part of an all-day program of sports and gaiety.

The Field Day schedule will begin sharply at 9:30, James A. Martin, supervising principal, announced last night. From 9:30 to 10:15 there will be a program of competitive events for Senior and Junior high school boys and girls. Students will report to their home room teachers at 10:30 and will march to their positions on the field fifteen minutes later to wait the May Day Procession.

The Queen's court will be made up of the Junior girl fencers as the Royal Guard, the seventh grade girls, who will present a peasant dance and a jester dance, the eighth grade girls, who will do the traditional May Pole dance and the Court of Honor in the Minuet.

After lunch grade school activities will begin, with comic races, novelties and a variety of sports events, ending with the presentation of ribbons to the day's winners. At 4 the baseball game between Kingston Township High School and Lehman will begin.

Thomas Carle, Jr., will be clerk of the meet and the entire faculty will co-operate in directing the affair and supervising the children.

The Field Day of Kingston Township High School is an annual event and it has become increasingly colorful and spectacular. Today's program is expected to be especially creditable to Professor Martin and his faculty.
