Obviously, these people could not be left to starve. Their situation was not of their own making. Even now, 35 2 few of them enjoy being helped by the government, and many of them resent the political aspect of their relief jobs. When they can, they find jobs elsewhere and move. It appears that the community is, unless something unforeseen steps in to check the decline. to become a ghost town.


