Suspected Armistice Near

Albert Stitzer, of Orchard Street, Shavertown, who served with Company B, 145th Battalion, Light Tank Corps, was stationed at the Bayonville front when the war came to an end. The men had suspected that an armistice would be signed for several days before it came about, he says, and the confirmation brought no cele-bration among them. They were just glad it was over.

He fought with the tank corps at St. Mihiel and in the Argonne Forest. Of 144 six-ton, 2-men tanks which had started at St. Mihiel, only five were fit for action at the end of Argonne.


