Hard-Fought Games Go Extra Periods

Laketon Makes Strong Bid Against League-Leading Township Five

The seasonal high-point for excitement was reached in two extra period games Friday night, when Lehman High school returned to form with a surprising 24-22 defeat of Kingston Township and Laketon made a valiant bid for fame in losing to Dallas Township 28-29.

Before one of the biggest crowds of the season, the Laketon five fought the league-leading Dallas Township quintet to a standstill, losing only after James Knecht, Dallas brilliant scoring ace, sunk a foul shot in the closing moments of an extra period. Knecht was high scorer for Dallas Township with 15 points.

Chat Rusloski turned the trick for Lehman by tallying a field goal against K. T. H. S. in another extra period game rivalling the Laketon-Dallas Township contest for excitement.

The Kingston Township girls took possession of first place with a decisive 25-19 victory over Lehman in a preliminary game, while the Dallas Township sextet tightened its hold on third place by defeating Laketon 26-14.

The borough girls, champions of last year, now trail by one game, with four wins and one loss. Playing at Kingston Township tonight, the local six has reached the crucial game of the season. A loss will mean almost certain defeat in the championship race while a victory will bring the two teams into a tie for first place.

Dallas Township clinched the title in the boys' rural basketball league in winning over Laketon Friday. With eleven victories and one loss and only four games to go before the season ends March 10, the Township can lose all the rest of its games and still be at least one game ahead of the field.

Kingston Township's loss to Lehman brought the latter team out of the cellar and gave the borough boys a clear title to second place with six wins and five losses. Tonight, however, K. T. H. S. has a chance to redeem itself when it plays host to Dallas Borough, while Lehman and Laketon fight it out in the lower bracket on the Harvey's Lake court.
