heart-rending one-acter which we called "Judgment". That time—we may as well make a clean confession—we killed a woman, although, as we recall the script, it was sort of poetic justice and she was a pretty weedy specimen.

It probably does not change matters to swear here that we shall never again write a play in which anyone is shot. The possibility that we shall ever again be encouraged to fashion a play will probably hit an all-time low about next Friday night, after the final curtain has dropped on the rootin', tootin' horse opera which Mr. Kiefer and your Postscripter lately fashioned for the Laing Fire Co.

We know quite well how "Lucky" Woolbert feels when, in the first act, he explains to Kate that his "reputation will be his crepe some day". "I have a reputation," he says, referring to his recent success in rubbing out a critical cow puncher, "and people expect me to live up to it." Since Fred and this column began notching our six-shooters we too, have been accused of more bloodthirstiness than we deserve.

For instance, the slanderous rumor that we killed so many of the characters before the second act certain that we hadn't enough to finish the play and had to rewrite the first and second acts was a gross libel, inaugurated by an envious fellow-journalist who was merely jealous because he had never written a play, even a bad one, like ours.

Even seasoned killers have their gallant moments. In the first draft, for instance, we killed Madame LaBelle, but in the revision we brought her back to life. A knife lays her low, but she lives, a flesh-and-blood proof of the sentimentality of the two amateur playwrights. It would have taken only a few seconds on the typewriter, too, to send Sheriff Jones and his deputy, "Lumpy" Lapp, shuffling off this mortal coil, in one crucial scene when we stifled the temptation. Their continued existence was essential if virtue was to triumph at the end of the third act.

Hardened criminals we may be, but both Mr. Kiefer and your Postscripter are grateful—grateful to Mrs. Harold Rood, for doing a swell job with a crazy script and grateful to a fine cast, which is breathing life into characters which were a little on the undernourished side when the playwrights moulded them. If you enjoy the play—and there are those who are willing to promise that you will—it will be to the everlasting credit of Mrs. Rood, her cast and an unusually hard-working committee.

As for us, we are troubled these days by a stubborn anecdote which, at almost any other time in our life, would have been innocent enough. It concerns the author whose play ran two nights. The playwright, himself, ran four nights and was awfully tired when they caught him.

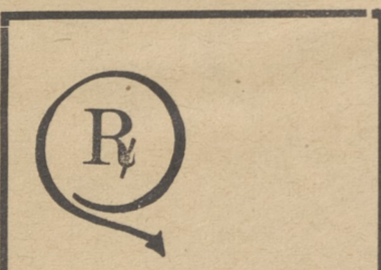
