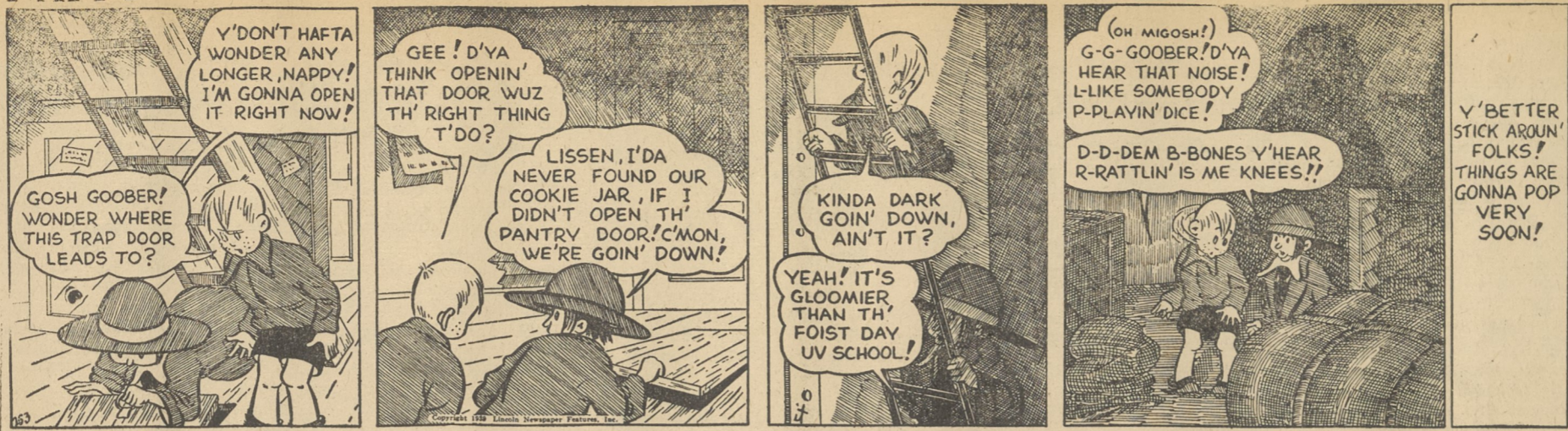

Speed Aces Head For Langhorne

100-Mile Classic Set For Sunday, June 16

Langhorne, Pa., June 6—Winners and speed stars of Memorial Day auto races throughout the country, including the big Indianapolis grind, will gather at Langhorne Speedway on Sunday, June 16, for a try at the purse of the final distance and longest big car racing program of the 1940 eastern season.

Entry blanks have been mailed to the ten money winners of the Hoosier 500-miler and Promoter Ralph Hankinson is confident that a large percentage of the ten as well as other chauffeurs who stood out but failed to finish in the money will be in the Langhorne June 16 list.

The 100-miler, first to be held on the world's fastest mile speedway in a half-decade, will be the feature event of a combination sprint and endurance card which is expected to draw many of the past Langhorne winners, most recent of whom is Ted Horn, winner of the May 12 meet and fourth money man at Indianapolis.

Another Hoosier place man is Mauri Rose, third position. Rose is also a past Langhorne winner, having chalked up one of the most sensational victories in the colorful history of the Bucks County bowl, a blanket finish which found Rose edging out Ben Shaw and Billy Winn.

Although Horn garnered the big money at the last Langhorne meet, he had to put up a stiff argument against the advances of two other early entries for the coming 100-mile classic, Everett Saylor and Joie Chitwood, in addition to Tony Willman, who set the pace until his car balked.
