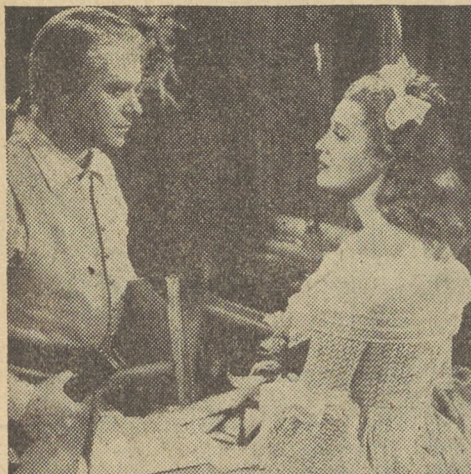


NEW MOON

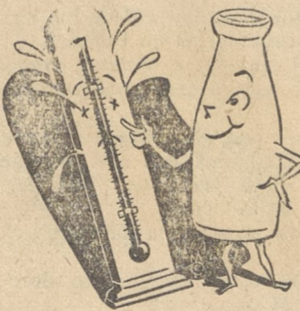

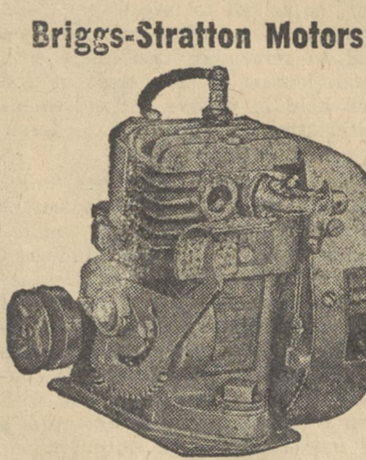
