An Ordinance of the Borough of
Dallas, Commonwealth of Pennsylv-
ania, fixing the tax rate for the
fiscal year 1941.
Be it ordained and enacted, and
it is hereby ordained and enacted
by the Council of the Borough of
Dallas, Commonwealth of Pennsylv-
ania:
Section I. That a tax be and the
same is hereby levied on all prop-
erty and occupations within the
said Borough, subject to taxation
for Borough purposes, for the fiscal
year 1941, as follows:
Tax rate for General Borough
purposes, the sum of fifteen and
one-half (15 1/2) mills on each dol-
lar of assessed valuation.
Section II. That any ordinance,
or part of ordinance, conflicting with
this ordinance be and the same is
hereby repealed insofar as the same
affects this ordinance.
