Make These Pep Easter Sweets For The Kiddies Without Sugar

Chief charm of these delightful, crunchy nests is the speed with which they can be turned out! But take note—they require no sugar. Milk chocolate, Pep cereal and jelly beans are the only ingredients. Happily, the cereal is vitamin-enriched so that these attractive Easter sweets have a "good-for-you-ness" as well. The recipe follows.

Not even a sugar ration card can stop the Easter bunny this year! It's the time to follow loved traditions rather than discard them. And for youngsters, Easter, next to Christmas, is the gayest, happiest day of the whole year.

But if Easter sweets are to be made at home they'll have to be turned out without benefit of sugar. Actually, that's no chore. Here are three dandies: Marshmallow Dream Candy, and Maple All-Bran Creams.

Pep Easter Nests

¾ pound milk chocolate
½ pound egg-shaped jelly beans
3½ cups Pep, vitamin enriched wheat flakes.

Melt chocolate over hot but not boiling water; stir in Pep, vitamin enriched wheat flakes. Place tablespoonfuls of mixture on wax paper and form into shape of a nest. Allow chocolate to harden. Fill nests with colored jelly beans to represent eggs. (Use as favors.) Yield: 10 nests (2¾-inches diameter).

Marshmallow Dream Candy

12 marshmallows, cut in quarters
1 pound sweet or dipping chocolate, melted.

½ cup broken nut meats.
Arrange marshmallows and nuts in greased pan; cover with melted chocolate. When cool cut in squares. Approximate yield: 16 pieces.

Maple All-Bran Creams

1½ cups maple syrup
½ cup cream
¼ teaspoon salt
½ cup bran
¾ cup chopped nutmeats

Place the maple syrup, cream and salt in a saucepan and stir until blended. Cover the pan for one minute so that steam will wash sugar crystals from side of pan. Cook slowly to 236° F. or until a soft ball forms when a little of the mixture is dropped in cold water. Pour on a cold wet platter and cool to lukewarm. Work the mixture with a spatula, folding it over and over until it begins to grow firm. Knead with the hands until smooth and creamy. Form into balls the size of a large hickory nut and roll in bran which has been crushed and mixed with nutmeats. Yield: 18 candies (¾-inch in diameter).
