Sterling Farms Has New Manager

Swingle Will Direct 3000-Acre Enterprise

Senator Andrew J. Sordoni has announced the appointment of Ellis Swingle, a resident of Swingledale, as general manager of Sterling Farms at Harvey's Lake.

Mr. Swingle has been in the employment of the Sordoni Construction Company for the past twenty-five years as construction superintendent. In that capacity he had charge of the construction of Wilkes-Barre Y. M. C. A., and Kingston High School and for the past ten years has supervised all of the construction at Bucknell University including the rebuilding of old Main and the erection of the new Engineering Building and Davis Gymnasium. He has just recently completed the construction of one of the largest war plants in the East.

Commenting on the appointment, Mr. Sordoni said: "He is one of the best construction men in the game, but he felt that he'd like to get on a farm and both he and I are delighted that it can be worked out."

Mr. Swingle grew up as a farm boy. As farm manager he will have complete supervision of Sterling Farm, all of its mechanical installations, its splendid herd of high-producing Guernseys and its more than 3000 acres of farmland.

John Cowan, head herdsman, will direct the care of the registered cows which produce more than 2000 pounds of milk daily. There are 135 cows, calves and bulls in the herd which is one of the largest and most highly valued in this section of Pennsylvania.

Many of the Back Mountain community people are personally acquainted with the Sterling Farm from attendance at the Grassland Farming Field Days held at the farm under Penn State auspices. Most of the land now devoted to grassland farming is land that formerly was worthless and has been reclaimed from swampy, marshy land by the use of huge bulldozers which accomplished the necessary drainage. Former apple orchards with limited productivity were likewise cleared and reclaimed in a single day by the use of efficient up-to-the-minute farming methods.

Problems of soil erosion have been most successfully overcome on the Sterling Farms and Senator Sordoni has aided many surrounding farmers solve this age old problem of soil erosion loss. Ladino clover plays a major part in this grassland farm.

Ellis Swingle will start his new duties immediately.

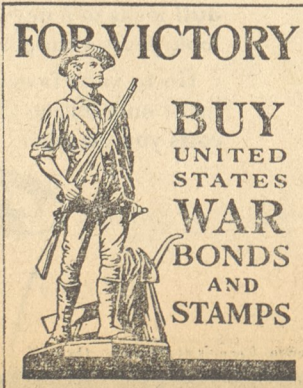
Tannery Men Resume Work

Second Walkout Is Short Lived

For the second time within a week the Noxen plant of the Armour Leather Company was closed on Monday by a labor dispute. The first walkout affecting all departments of the tannery came a week ago Wednesday when men refused to go to work until they were guaranteed a full 40-hour work week. The men returned to work the following day after a conference between representatives of the Fur and Leather Workers' Local and company officials had ironed out all difficulties.

Monday's short-lived walkout apparently resulted from a misunderstanding of the terms by which the first strike was settled. Like the first walkout it was settled quickly after members of the union held a mass meeting in the Noxen Theatre. All men returned to work again on Tuesday morning.

Both labor disputes had their inception in a shortage of hides which has curtailed production at the Noxen plant. According to the union contract, all extra men were to be laid off during such periods giving the older men as much employment as possible. The union claimed that this was not being done and has put the problem in the hands of a grievance committee to issue an appeal.

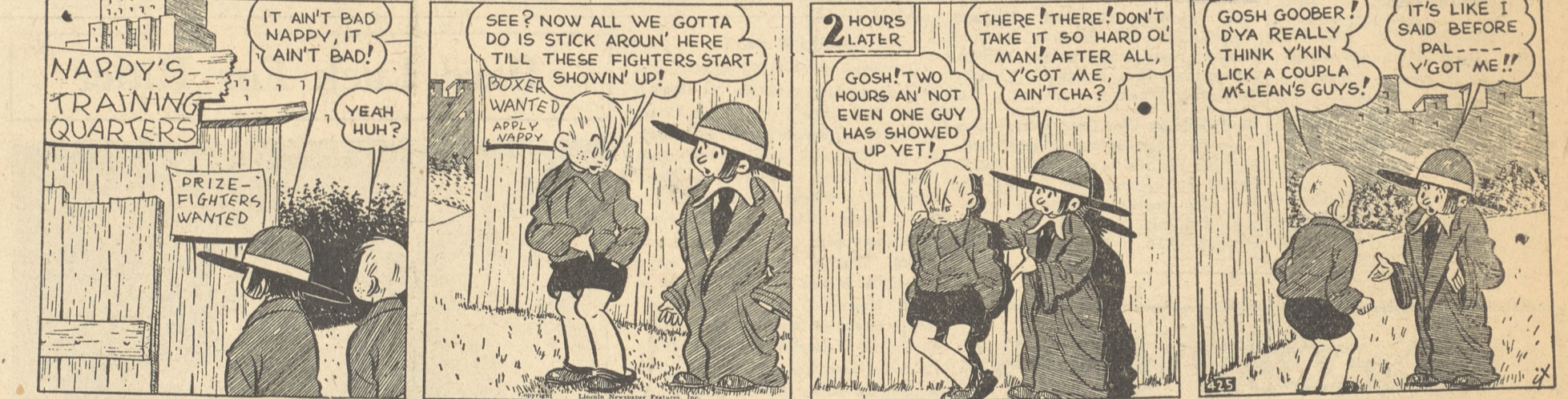

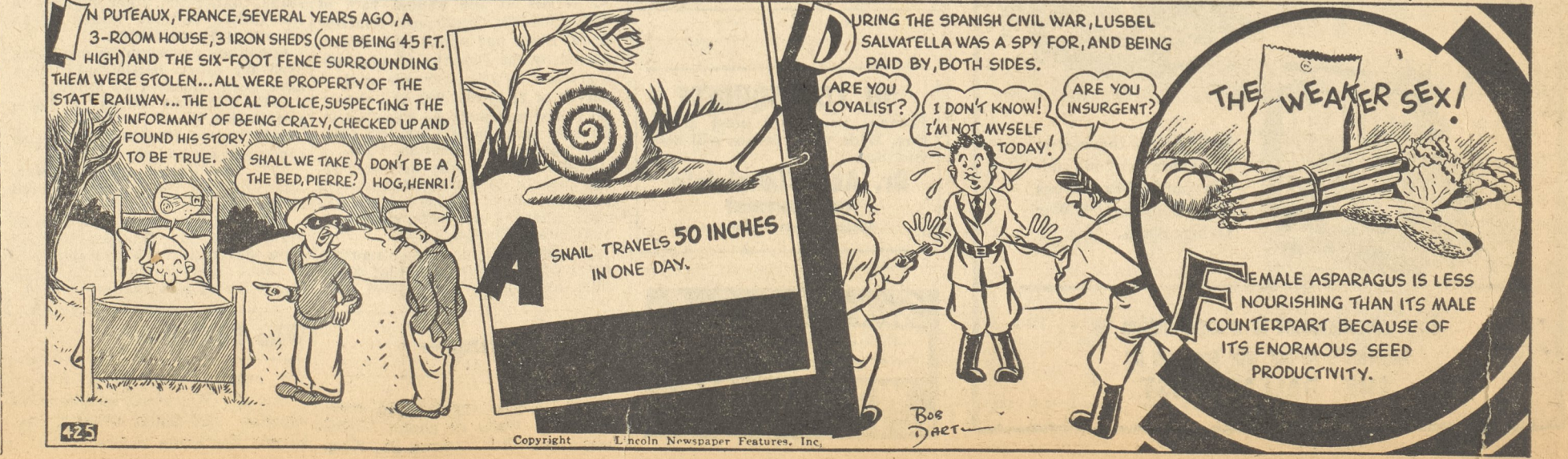
