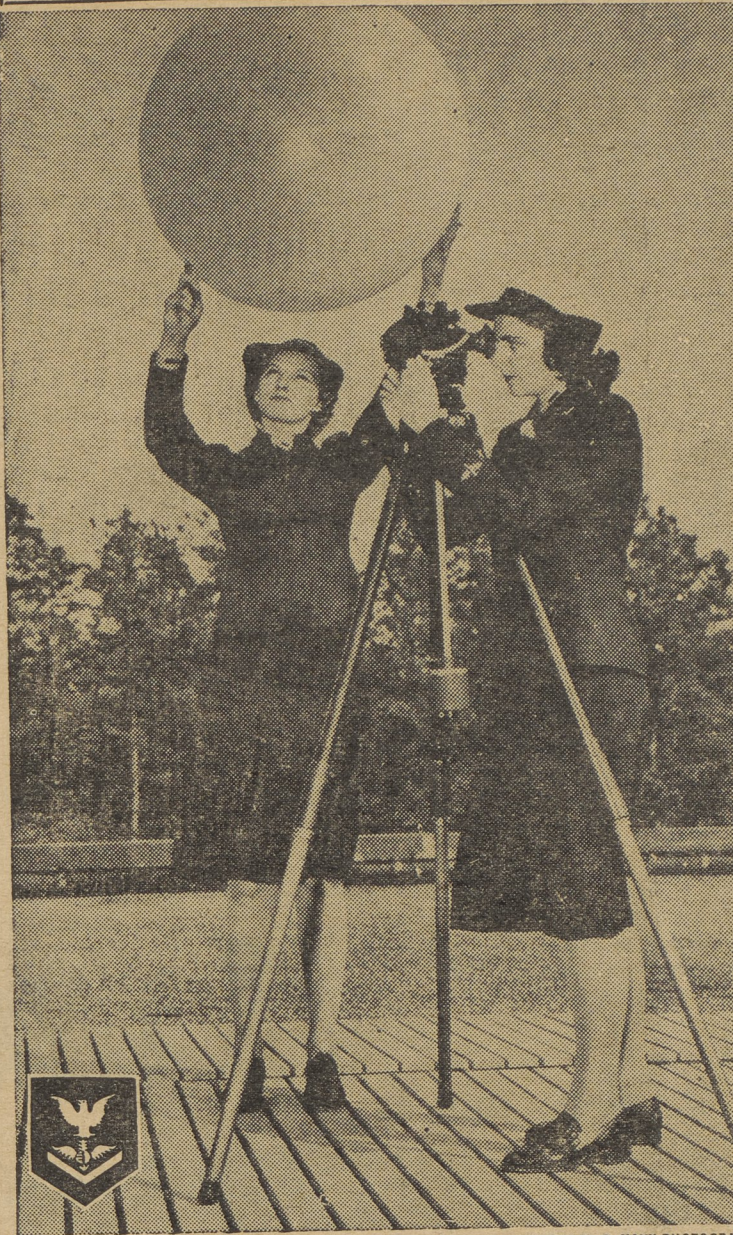
Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Henning, visited their parents during the holidays.

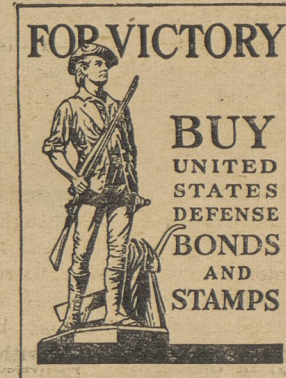
