Lee J. Griffith Is Buried On Wednesday

Funeral services for Lee J. Griffith, brother of Mrs. R. M. Scott and Mrs. W. L. Tracy of Trucksville were held from the Brickel Funeral Home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. W. Herbert Sugden officiated.

Acting as pallbearers were R. M. Scott, Jerome Johnson, Edward Varet and George Bonning.

Burial was in Hollenback Cemetery.

Mr. Griffith, former resident of Wilkes-Barre and for many years a member of George M. Dallas Lodge in Dallas, died suddenly of pneumonia Sunday morning at his home in Pittsburgh where he had resided for around fifteen years.

Son of the late David R. and Ann Griffith of Wilkes-Barre, he received his early education in Wilkes-Barre public schools. As an electrical engineer he worked on the construction of the Laurel Line in Wilkes-Barre and helped in the electrification of the Pennsylvania Railroad tunnel under the Hudson River. From New York he went to Pittsburgh where he was employed at the time of his death.

Surviving besides Mrs. Scott and Mrs. Tracy are several nephews and a niece: Robert W. Johnson and W. Jerome Johnson of Ashley; Lee Tracy of Hollywood, Cal.; Tracy Griffith of Frankfort, Ind.; Edythe Griffith Vernoy of Anderson, S.C.

Life Imprisonment For Crimes Of Sex

Harrisburg, Nov. 20, (PNS)—Looking toward finding ways and means of curbing a rising tendency of juvenile delinquency in Pennsylvania, the Legislature's special committee studying penal laws and criminal procedure is considering recommending to the next session of the Legislature that habitual sex offenders be eligible for life imprisonment.

In a letter to the committee, Judge Samuel A. Weiss, of the Allegheny Court said: "If I were a member of the Legislature again, I would increase the penalty in sex crimes, and also provide another section as an amendment to the Criminal Code, that the Courts of the Commonwealth, be given the discretionary power to sentence for life, if necessary, on sex crime repeaters."

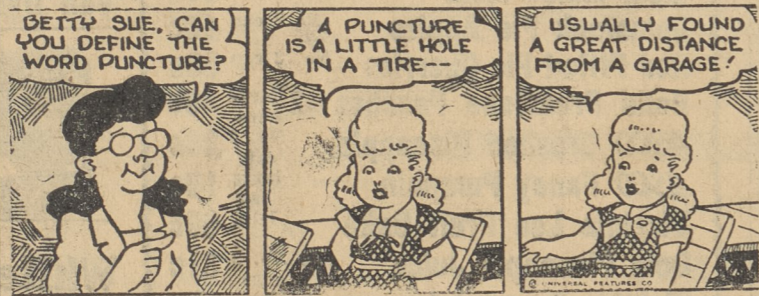

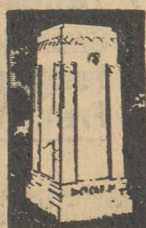
