Private Flying Increases, Death **Rate Declines**

Although private flying in this State increased more than 100 per cent in 1947, the number of deaths from airplane accidents was proportionately 26 per cent less than in 1946.

This is shown in the Pennsylvania Aeronautics Commission's "Annual Report of Aeronautical Violations and Accidents for 1947."
