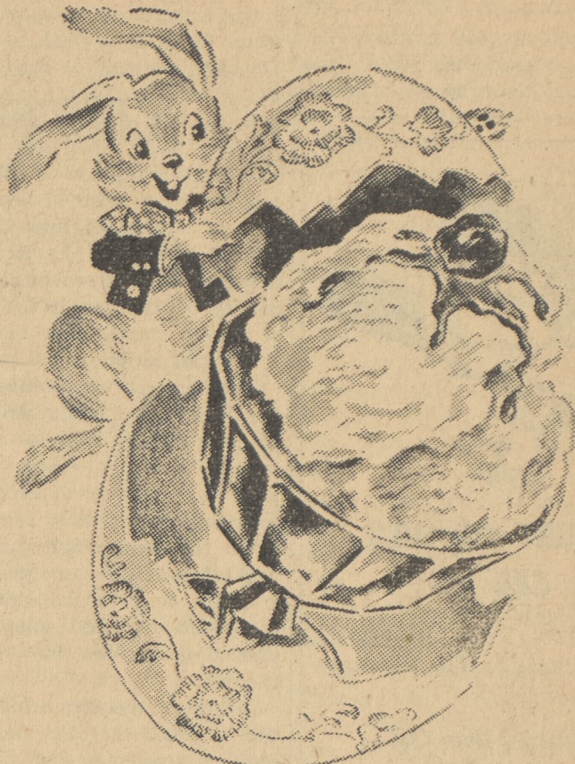
The game started off at a slow pace, but soon both sides were exhibiting their skill in shots. The Borough guards again resorted to zoning but Fairview was up on the long shots.
