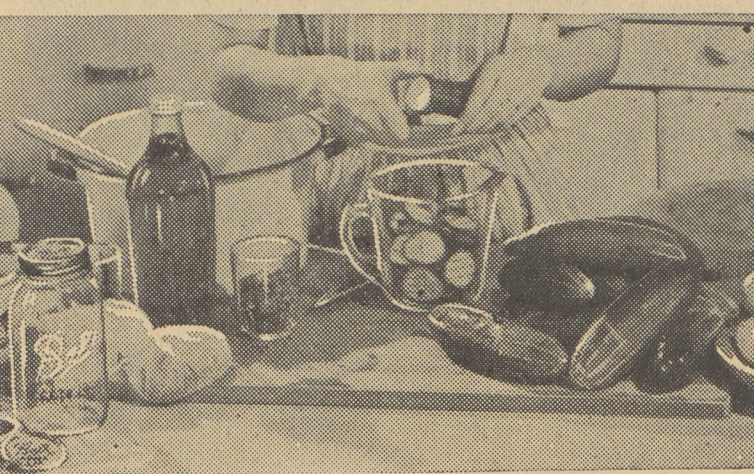

2 tablespoons mustard seed
1 teaspoon turmeric
½ teaspoon celery seed
1 piece horseradish
Soak cucumbers and onions (separately) 5 to 10 hours in brine made by dissolving one-half cup of salt in one-half gallon cool water. Drain well. Add onion, 2½ cups vinegar, and 2½ cups water to the cucumbers. Simmer about 15 minutes. Do not cook until soft. Drain. Discard liquid in which scalded. Make sirup by boiling the sugar and spices with three cups vinegar and one cup water for five minutes. Pack well-drained cucumbers and onions in hot Ball Jars. Cover with boiling sirup and seal.

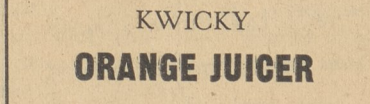
