BI-COUNTY LEAGUE SCHEDULE PLAYOFFS

Noxen at East Dallas.
Orange at Beaumont.
Games to start at 2:30 P.M.

Although rain halted all scheduled games in the Bi-County and Susquehanna Leagues, standings were straightened out in hastily called meetings early this week.

Tuesday night Bi-County League managers decided to cancel all re-

maining games and begin the playoffs immediately . . . Orange and East Dallas, who were to have played last Sunday to decide a tie for second place chose to flip a coin. Lady Luck was with East Dallas as it won the toss and became the sole possessors of second place.

Playoffs start Sunday with fourth-place Noxen meeting second-place East Dallas on Dallas Township diamond . . . East Dallas will start Art Bellas and Noxen is expected to counter with Granville Scouter or Art Blizzard . . . Orange will travel to Beaumont . . . Then comes the confusion, if Miners Mills beats Railway, it'll play Shawnee and the winner of this game will play the victor in the Dallas-Wanamie encounter to decide the first place spot . . . If Miners Mills loses Sunday, Shawnee will play winner of the Dallas-Wanamie game, with the victor of the final tilt to take over first place. At the rate the games are going it will be at least two weeks before the playoffs can begin.

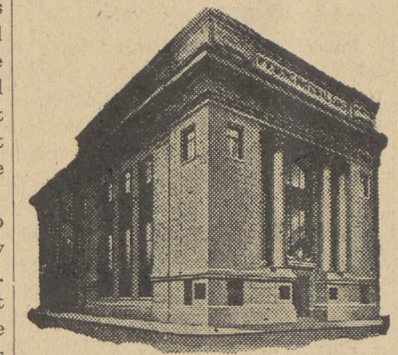
