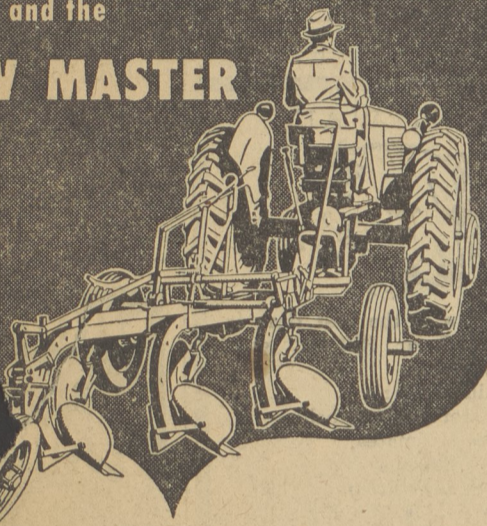
He was home for one night last week after completing a voyage which included ports of call at Trinidad, Santos, Rio de Janeiro, Buenos Aires and Montevideo.
