A Message to Veterans

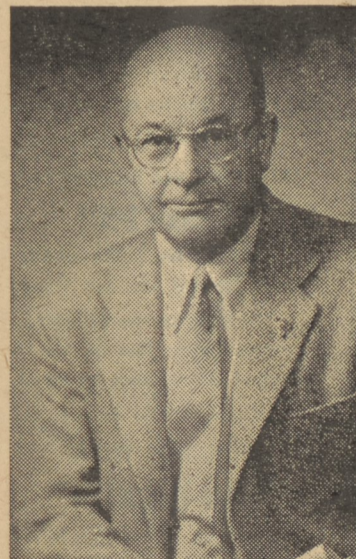
The ex-GIs who have signed their names to this letter, all served under Jay Cooke in the 3rd Battalion, 110th Infantry, 28th Division, in the last war.
