Thursday they delivered twenty-four pints, packaged in small containers, then stored in a larger tin box filled with ice to the plane leaving at 10:43 a. m. and arriving in Chicago at 2:30 p. m. where it was re-iced. Next stopping place for the precious liquid was San

Francisco, where it arrived at 1:15 a. m. and on to Oak Knoll Naval Hospital, Oakland, Cal., into the hands of Lt. M. T. Sproul who again filled the box with fresh ice. It arrived in Korea sometime Saturday where it no doubt is saving some boys' lives by this time.
