Lehman Scotties won their second consecutive Back Mountain championship with Saturday's 20-0 victory over Dallas Township. The rampaging Scotties held to a 6-0 halftime count were not to be denied and broke loose for two touchdowns in the second half to completely overpower Dallas Township.

Lehman's defensive work was outstanding with the play of the ends Dick Kern and Wojciehoski definitely a strong point. One of the unsung stars of the game was Ron Nuss who directed the Lehman attack and supplied the extra punch in the ground attack when needed.

Lehman scored early in the first period when it stalled a Dallas drive after the opening kickoff by recovering a fumble on its own 40-yard line. Lehman then started its own drive which ended with Ron Nuss scoring on a quarterback sneak from the 2-yard line.

When Lehman took the field the second half, however, it was a different story. The Scotties went to work and with Graham doing most of the carrying advanced to the Dallas 30-yard line. Graham then faded back, spotted Kern all alone on the Dallas 15-yard line and completed a beautiful pass play for a touchdown. A Graham to Kern aerial was good for the extra-point.

Lehman led in first downs fifteen to eight and in total pass yardage 64 to 51. The game was marked by relatively few penalties with ten yards marked against Lehman and twenty yards against Dallas Township.
