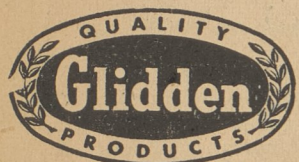

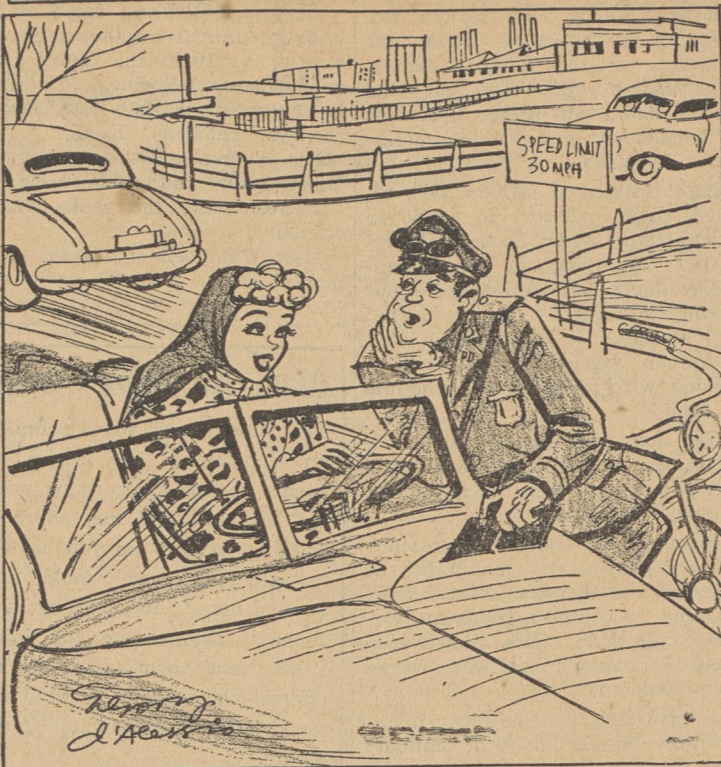
Mrs. Sherman Kunkle has been dividing her time for the past week between her own home and that of her mother, Mrs. Stanley Case, in Shavertown.

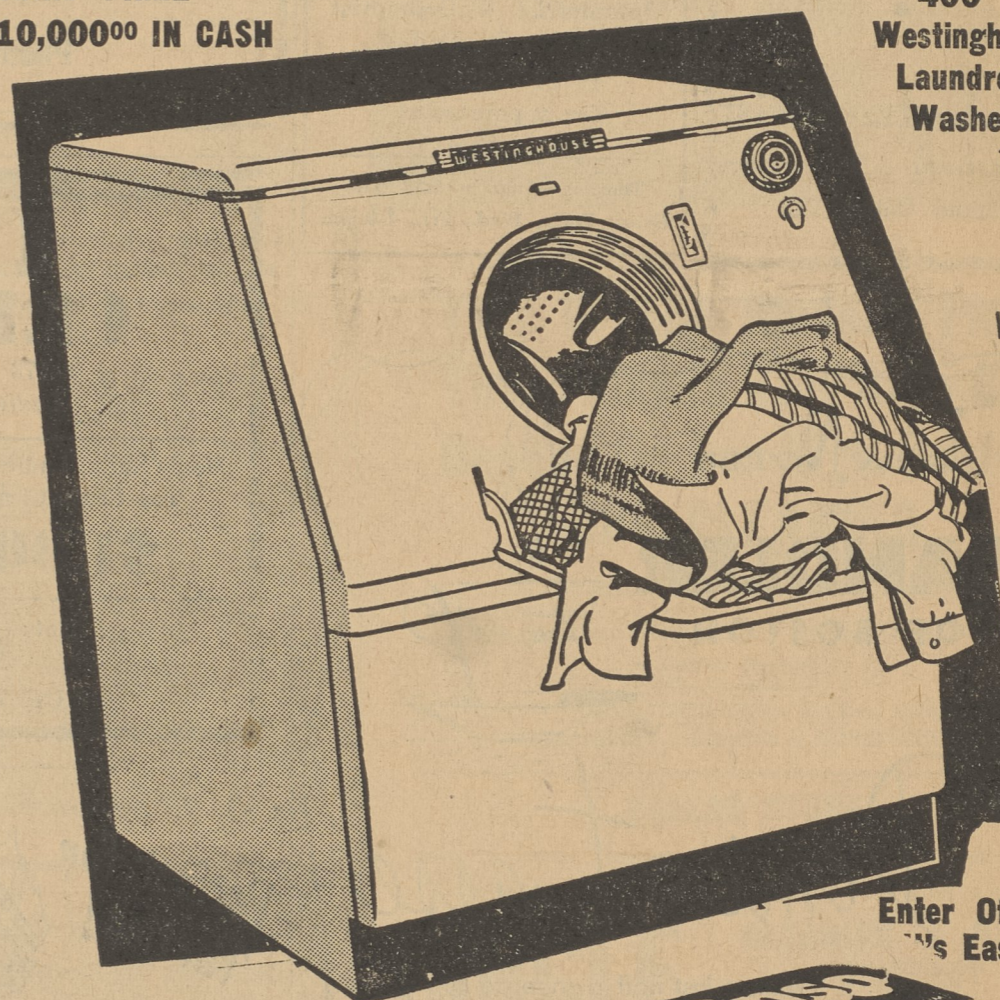
