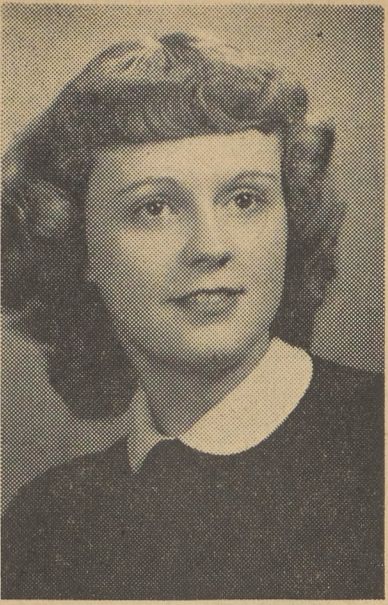
Purple Finches Here

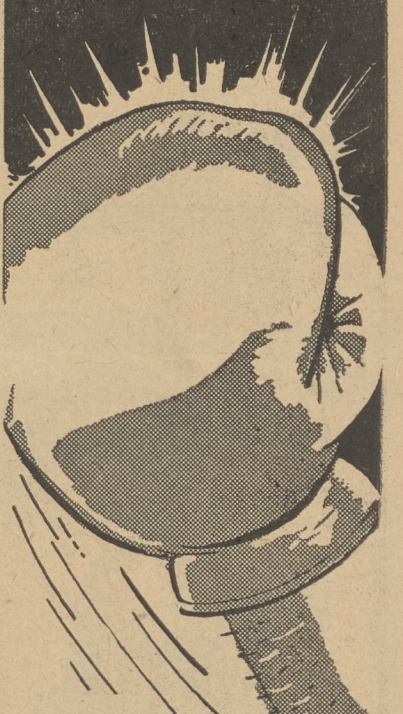
