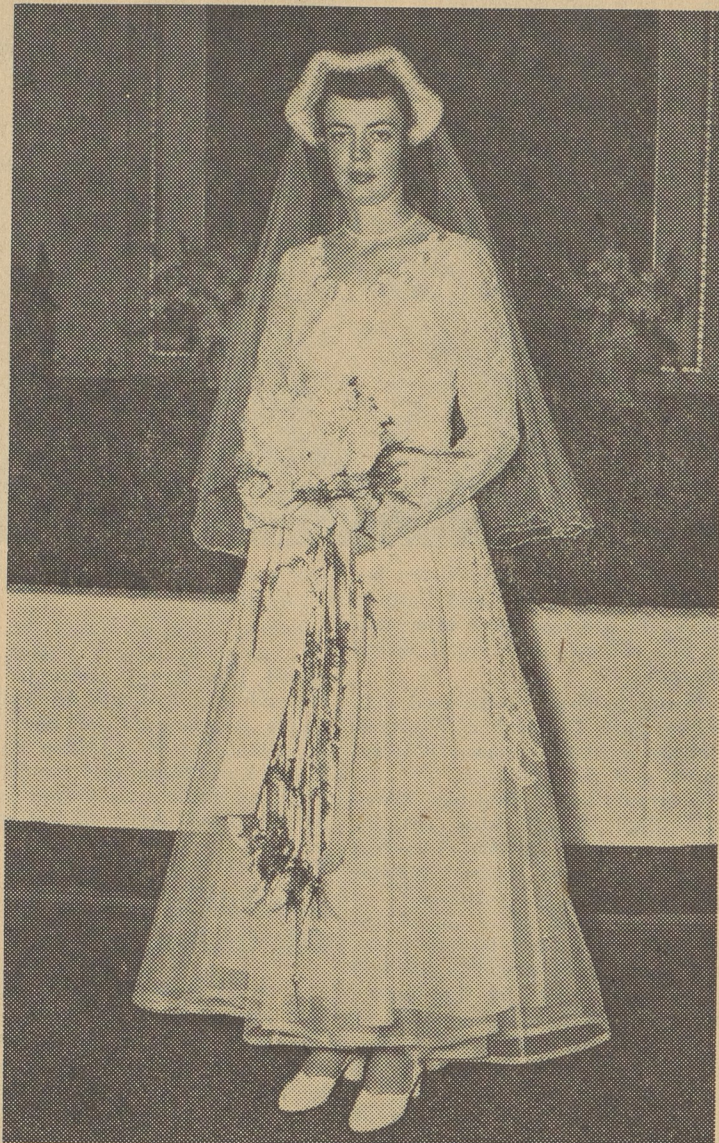

Following the ceremony, a reception will be held in the Church parlors and the couple will leave on a trip.

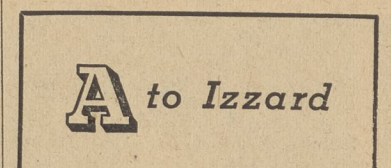
