Lehman Group Does Well At Convention

Three boys from Lehman-Jackson Joint High School were among the 1400 Future Farmers of America who attended the State Convention at Pennsylvania State College June 10, 11, and 12.

Darrel Major placed third in the Poultry Judging Contest, George Major judged Dairy Cattle and Joe Brown was in the Farm Mechanics Contest. George was 49th among 395 contestants.

In addition to the judging contests, the boys witnessed educational demonstrations on such subjects as Wildlife, Livestock, Poultry, Forestry, Dairy and Agronomy. They attended several mass meetings where they were entertained by the talent of fellow FFA members, saw a science show presented by General Motors, listened to the State FFA Band and Chorus and were addressed by Vice-Dean Russell Dickerson of the School of Agriculture.

Highlight of the Wednesday evening mass meeting was an informal talk given by Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of the College. Dr. Eisenhower reminded the boys of their responsibilities as they grew into a difficult world and contrasted the world of his boyhood to today's complicated sphere.

The group returned by way of Bellefonte, visiting the fish hatchery there and watching the anglers plying famous "Fisherman's Paradise." They were accompanied by Lawrence Drabick, Vocational Ag-

riculture instructor at Lehman-Jackson School.

Mrs. B. T. Sutliff Was Native Of Lake

The funeral of Mrs. B. T. Sutliff, 77, of Benton, was held Sunday from a Benton funeral home. Rev. Clifford Williams of Benton Methodist Church officiated.

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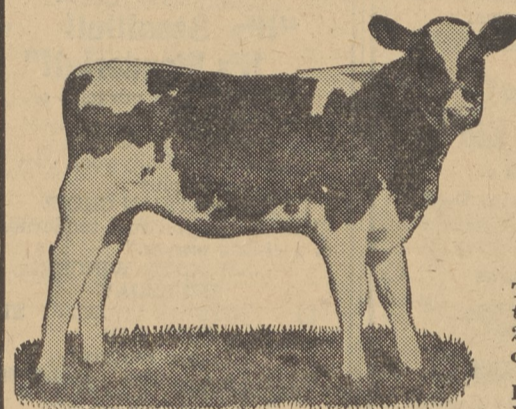
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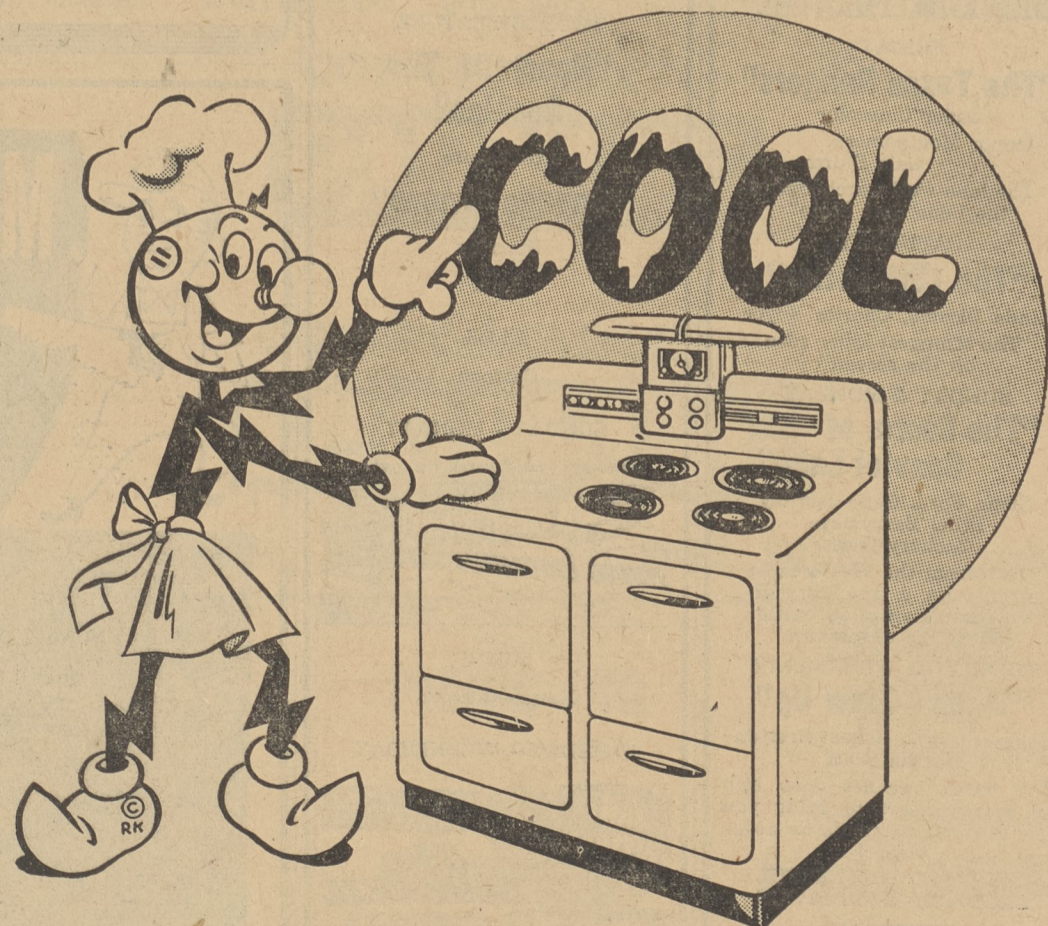


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
