Koom Essa! Let's Eat With The Pennsylvanische Deitch

Koom essa! Let's eat! will be the most popular expression in vogue with Pennsylvanische Deitch and "outlanders" alike, at the Pennsylvania Dutch Folk Fair, August 29-September 1, at Selinsgrove.

Aware of the almost universal appeal of traditional Dutch food, the sponsors of the Folk Fair, the Pennsylvania Dutch Folklore Center, of Franklin & Marshall College are making preparations to provide for the serving of vast quantities of favorite Dutch dishes.

To date, women of eight churches in Snyder County, in the heart of the central Pennsylvania Dutch-speaking country, are looking forward eagerly to serving their specialties to the largest gathering of appreciative diners in their years of serving church suppers.

These same women—daily practitioners of the famed Pennsylvania Dutch culinary art—are now preparing menus and placing their orders for provisions in anticipation of the four-day Folk Fair. Certain of receiving favored places on these menus will be such traditional delicacies as chicken bot boi, schnitz, ugnapp, fastnachts, spare ribs and sauerkraut and string beans baked with ham.

Other Dutch specialties food-loving fairgoers have to look forward to are home-made bread, shoofly pie, rivvel soup, and various other dishes. And while authorities point out that the famed "seven sweets and seven sour" of a traditional Pennsylvania Dutch meal actually grew out of a myth, it is one myth which will receive a lot of popular support whenever it is mealtime—which will be all the time—during the impending Folk Fair.

When fairgoers are not eating, it is just such interesting facets of Pennsylvania Dutch folklore as the

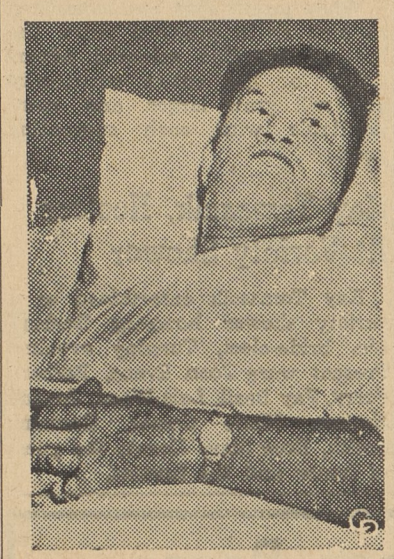
"seven sweets and seven sour" myth that will be explained to the uninitiated in what may be termed the "Food for Thought" department. Such discussions will take place continuously throughout each day and evening in the main program tent. It is here that explanations in both a humorous and serious vein will be offered for many of the traditions and practices of the Pennsylvania Dutch.

From an overall standpoint, the Folk Fair will add up to an intensive effort to touch on all phases of life in the home, church, school and community of the good Dutch people of central Pennsylvania.

Mr. Miller, former Administrator of the Federal Security Agency, who was succeeded by the present incumbent, Oscar Ewing, and later was Commissioner of Immigration, was recently appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate as a member of the Subversive Activities Control Board.

The board was set up under the Internal Security Act to determine whether Communist-front organizations must register with the Government. The board is now holding hearings to force the Communist Party to register.

He predicted an era of substantial residential and business expansion for the Back Mountain country, and said he felt that the area would become a famous and much patronized health and pleasure resort.
