You'd think adolescence was a disease instead of a perfectly natural ripening process.

Face it folks. It's an emotional and mental reaction, and it is brought about not by growing up but by an unwillingness to admit the facts. That slouch and that posture are designed to conceal the

fact that the terrain which used to be streamlined and sleek, pinioned in the smooth little garments of childhood, has undergone a change.

Mother can see to it that underpinning is of a proper nature to give the teen-ager a feeling of poise. But it is completely useless for her to nag, "Why on earth don't you stand up, Rosemary?" or Nathalie or Bernice or Mary.

Rosemary isn't having any. It is easier to slouch.

I know a smart mother who moves frequently, and do you know what she does before she unpacks the china? She arranges with a local handyman to install a horizontal bar in the back yard. It's for fun, and the children go for it in a big way. If their mother told them it was to keep their backs straight and their muscles in trim, promoting good carriage, they'd shun it like the plague.

Most mothers do not have this insight. They still think of Rosemary as she was three years ago, lithe and lean instead of lumpy.

That's where ballet training comes in. Because it's fun, because there's a chance to wear a pretty costume and go in for the school shows, because the fluid motion of a correctly balanced body gives poise and lightness.

We're not talking about training for the stage or for a career. A serious ballet artist works hours a day, never letting up on her routine, and very few girls have what it takes to dedicate themselves so completely. What we do say, and with seriousness, is that while calisthenics are usually approached with indifference, ballet technique is fascinating, it pays dividends of grace, strengthened insteps and ankles, correlation of arm and leg movements, and a walk which is a joy to the beholder.

It's too bad that it is not part of the school curriculum, for girls need the assurance of grace and physical fitness. It is all too easy to forget to "stand tall," making the most of every inch of height.
