Half A Pint Is Better Than None, At Sherman Schooley Donation Day

For the benefit of those residents who hesitate to part with an entire pint of blood but feel reassured about giving a lesser amount, E. P. Bowers, Red Cross, states that a half pint is enough for a transfusion for a baby, and that half a pint is better than none. Almost anybody can afford a pint, but there are times when a half pint withdrawal is advisable instead of the regular amount.

Residents of the Back Mountain who might hesitate to donate a pint, but who want to swell the total of donors for Dr. Sherman Schooley Day at Dallas Borough School, February 2, may rest assured that trained medical staff and nurses will not permit them to give more than they can afford to donate.

Nobody who is in poor condition to donate will be permitted to do so, and no more blood will be withdrawn than the donor can afford to lose. This provision is for safeguarding of both donor and recipient. The card of acknowledgment that a donor receives along with the blood-donor stick-pin, bears on it the type blood drawn, and the RH factor. This is a valuable piece

of information, saving a great deal of time if the donor should ever find himself suddenly in need of blood transfusion after an accident. With no need for tests to determine type, no time is wasted giving the life-saving blood. The card should be carried in the wallet along with drivers license and identification.

Giving a blood donation, and acquiring important information about your own type of blood may well be the means of saving your own life. A blood donation is a token payment for your own right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.
