Delegation Visits American LaFrance

Five Dallas firemen got a pre-view Saturday of Dr. Henry M. Laing Fire Company's new \$15,905 American LaFrance pumper on the assembly line at Elmira.


Making the trip were James Besecker, chief; Norti Berti, assistant chief; Alvin Shafer, driver; Henry Peterson, treasurer; and Arthur Dungey, trustee.

They made a guided tour of the big American LaFrance plant and were told that the pumper will be delivered in three to four weeks. It has already received its first rough coat of red paint, but wheels have not yet been assembled. The beautiful engine and body impressed everybody.

They also saw one of many \$45,-000 Crash Trucks being constructed for the U.S. Air Force. The heating and cooling systems on the Crash Trucks are constructed to operate smoothly at 60 below zero temperatures, encountered in Alaska, on at high temperatures for desert operation. They were told that the Crash Trucks are so insulated that they can be run right up to a flaming bomber for close-in fire fighting. Nozzles are aimed at the flames through portholes.
