John Manzoni and George Major participated in the Dairy Judging Contest; Bob Norris and Lester Lynn were in the Poultry Judging Contest. Bill scored best in the contest, placing 33rd for an honorable mention. George Major placed 57th among 416 contestants in dairy judging and Bob Norris placed 64 of 129 boys entered in the Poultry contest.

In addition to entering the contests, the boys attended educational demonstrations on such diverse subjects as Forestry, Wildlife, Dairy, Poultry, Livestock and Farm Mechanics. They were also taken on a tour of the College farms, including the newly occupied dairy barns, and a campus tour. During the evenings they were entertained at mass meetings where a featured attraction was the "House of Magic" show sponsored by the General Electric Company which demonstrated many unbelievable stunts conducted through the medium of light rays.
