DALLAS FIRE CHIEF WARNS OF DANGER BURNING REFUSE

After seeing a scorched spot on the roof of Dallas Branch, Miners National Bank Building, Fire Chief James Besecker states that it is time property owners get wise to the dangers of burning rubbish, especially papers and corrugated board, without some safeguard against flying embers.

The half consumed piece of corrugated board had apparently blown up from an incinerator. still afire, and burned itself out on the roof. It was discovereed when W. B. Jeter, Mr. Besecker, and Paul Shaver went to the roof last Friday to investigate possibility of locating the 250 pound fire siren on the coping.

Chief Besecker points out that the cause for a big fire in Meshoppen five years ago was burning waste paper which lodged in a protected spot and smouldered without being detected. He calls attention to the danger of eaves loaded with pine needles if a stray spark should be carried to the extremely combustible material. Householders as well as businessmen burning quantities of material easily windblown, should take care to cover the incinerator, and not burn at all in a high wind.
